14 Mile Road widening plan stirs concern

The planned widening of 14 Mile Road has some residents in Farm-ington Hills and West Bloomfield Township stewing. Farmington Hills officials have proposed widening the east-west tho-roughfare to five lanes in certain portions of the one-mile stretch be-tween Orchard Lake and Farming-ton coads.

Despite residents' opposition, the Farmington Hills City Council Monday adopted a resolution supporting the more than \$2 million widening

the more than \$2 million widening project.
Actual construction — approximately \$1.6 million — is eligible for a 75 percent grant through the Federal Aid to Urban Systems program. A still unanswered question is when the financing application must be mailed to authorities. Residents want to see changes in the road plans before the application is complete and mailed, said Ken Poye, president of the West Bloomfield-

A former Bloomfield Hills Middle School teacher faces a mandatory 20-year prison sentence for his part in delivering 10 ounces of cocaine shortly before a Farmington drug

An Oakland County jury deliberated most of the day Tuesday before finding Farmington Hills resident David Michael Schultz, 25, guilty of delivery of a controlled substance

Richard Headlee is unhappy with what some officals are trying to do to his 1978 constitutional tax limita-

tion amendment.
First, Waterford Public Schools unsuccessfully asked voters to walve the Headlee amendment. Walled Lake, West Bloomfield and Clarenceville public schools all plan

similar requests.
Headlee not only disagrees with what some public school districts are attempting, but said he believes district officials are barking up the wrong tree. It's the state Legislature that should be taken to task, not the Headlee amendment, he said.

"(Property) values have gone far beyond the increase of the Consumer Price Index," said Headlee, presi-dent and chief executive officer of Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance Co. of America in Farmington Hills.

THE AMENDMENT attempts to ensure that municipalities, school districts and other local governments don't benefit from inflationary increases in property values.

Simply, the amendment requires that when a local unit's state equalized valuation (SEV) grows faster than the rate of inflation, property tax rates must be rolled back to provide the same amount of tax reve-
