

League Distributes 18,000 Voter Guides

League of Women Voters members of West Bloomfield-Farmington Area are busy distributing 18,000 voter guides to the West Bloomfield and Farmington Community.

More than 50 women have been folding guides and counting them as well as distributing them in subdivisions. League members have even recruited friends and neighbors to help in this task. Girl Scouts in both areas are also helping.

Mrs. Milton (Ellen) Lichterman, Farmington, has used her basement as a main assembly point for getting the three separate parts of the guide together.

Each guide contains a state, county and local section. Even though the manpower is volunteer, the cost of printing the guides falls on league budgets.

It is for this voter service work and the other programs of the league that members are also involved in an annual campaign for funds.

Over 600 letters have gone out to the community asking for contributions and league members will be making calls in this effort.

Social Security On Phone Line

A new telephone service at the Pontiac social security office can handle "most social security business" without requiring personal visits to the office by the public, according to Eino J. Heino, manager for the Pontiac district office.

"We call it Teleservice," Heino said. "With it, we can handle a great deal of the pap-

erwork by phone that involves such social security matters as application for benefits, change of address of monthly checks and questions about social security programs, including Medicare."

With Teleservice, Heino said, social security personnel can, in many instances, fill out an application for benefits

over the phone, then mail the form to the beneficiary for his or her signature.

"We can also accept change of address information by phone from beneficiaries who are moving, so that delivery of their checks will not be interrupted," he said.

McConnell, Mrs. Benya Named As Planners

FARMINGTON Two new members have been appointed to the Farmington Township Planning Commission and two previous members resigned.

The new planning members are Robert McConnell, president of the Future Farmington Association (FFA), and Mrs. Barbara Benya, executive secretary of the Farmington Chamber of Commerce and FFA board member.

REAPPOINTED to another term on the township planning commission were James Maureen and Russell Nankervis.

One of the new appointees replace Chuck Lorlon, former commission chairman who resigned after moving from the community.

The other appointee replaces William Jarrett, who was not re-nominated for another term on the commission.

SUPERVISOR Curtis Hall nominated McConnell at last Monday's regular board meeting and asked that Jarrett, Maureen and Nankervis be re-appointed.

Mrs. Benya was nominated by Trustee Margaret Schaefer. Asking that Jarrett not be reappointed was Trustee Fred Lichtman.

The four were appointed to the planning commission by

passage of a motion, introduced by Lichtman and supported by Mrs. Schaefer, which deleted Jarrett from the list of nominees. The motion passed unanimously with no dissenting votes being voiced.

LIGHTMAN FIRST objected that both McConnell and Jarrett lived in the same subdivision, Canterbury Commons, and the commission should have a broader geographic representation.

Trustee Earl Oppenheimer countered that the man best qualified ought to serve on the commission and geographic locations should not be given first priority.

Lichtman then said his real objection was to having Jarrett being reappointed and he would like, instead, to have McConnell replace Jarrett on the commission.

Voicing his objection, Lichtman said, "I don't think a planning commission member should appear before this board on planning or zoning matters other than as a commission member."

Lichtman explained that Jarrett spoke to the board as a spokesman for Canterbury on a parochial matter only regarding residents of that subdivision. Jarrett had a chance to speak at the commission level, he added, and should not have addressed the board afterwards as a subdivision spokesman.

"To me, that just isn't right. My personal opinion is he should not serve on the planning commission," said Lichtman, "Either he wants to serve the township as a whole or serve his own subdivision."

MRS. BENYA lives in Kendallwood, Nankervis lives in Old Homestead and Maureen, lives in Briar Hill.

In nominating McConnell, Hall said his nominee has lived in the township for 4 1/2 years and has been active in many civic and community endeavors.

McConnell is past president of the Canterbury Commons Association and past board member of the Farmington Township Homeowners Association.

He received a BS from WSU and a BS in management from WSU. McConnell is married, has two children, and is employed as an engineer and salesman for Ford Motor Co.

IN MAKING the nomination, Hall made mention of McConnell's personal efforts in campaigning for consolidation last year and fighting annexation this year as FFA president.

Lichtman said he felt both McConnell and Mrs. Benya are well qualified to serve on the planning commission.

Nankervis, Maureen and Mrs. Benya will serve of the commission until Dec. 31, 1973. McConnell's term will expire Dec. 31, 1972.

Trustee Tom Nolan, also a planning commissioner, and Treasurer Mrs. Elise Avery were absent.
