SATURDAY keynote will be Charlotte B. Avery, director of special projects for the John Tracy Clinic, Los Angeles. Her theme will be "Programming the Home of the Hearing-Impaired Child."

The annual state-wide lipreading contest will take place Saturday morning. Winners will be announced at the awards luncheon at 1 p.m.

Royal C. Hayden, Jr., M.D., and Walter Wend will be chairmen for Friday and Saturday programs respectively.

DR. HAYDEN is a Detroit area otologist and director of the Otological Research Laboratory at Henry Ford Hospital. Wend, MABHS second vice-president, is director of special education for Berrien County Intermediate School District.
