Szymula's car and Wyche's auto collided bad-on, police said, killing both drivers. There were no

passengers.

Szymula and Wyche, of 8100 LaSalle Blod, Detroit, were both pronounced dead on arrival at Botsford General Hospila.

Traffic safety officials in the township said this accident briggs the number of fatalities here to 14 so far this year.
