## Dateline: Outdoors

Firearm deer hunters will set out Sunday. Nov. 15. to bag their buck or doe. But on the whole, they might not be so successful this year as in 1969.

Last year the state's deer-hunting nimrods harvested nearly 107,000 whitetails. They probably won't do so well for one good reason.

The state Dept. of Natural Resources has purposely ad-justed its quotas to cut the do-kill in half for the northern Lower Peninsula.

In addition, the State Legis-lature has forbidden hunters to take does in the entire Upper Peninsula.

ON THE bright side, however, permit quotas in the southern Lower Peninsula have been raised about 1,000 over last year in a continued effort to decrease the alarming rate of car-deer mishaps. In that part of the State.

In light of last summer's lower deer observations throughout many parts of northern Michigan, the DNR also expects this season's buck kill to slip somewhat unless

hunters turn out in good num-bers and are blessed with the kind of weather that spurs whitetail movements.
