

# Farmington, Borgess, Rice Dominate In Cross Country

It was quite a showing. Observerland cross country runners staged in the regional high school meets Saturday.

The area barriers competed in three Class A regionals—and won them all.

Farmington, St. Joseph, Flint Kearsley and Rice are considered the top teams for the state crown.

## Dateline: Outdoors

Firearm deer hunters will set out Sunday, Nov. 15, to bag their buck or doe. But on the whole, they might not be so successful this year as in 1969.

Last year the state's deer-hunting nirrords harvested nearly 100,000 whitetails. They probably won't do so well for one good reason.

The state Dept. of Natural Resources has purposely adjusted its quotas to cut the doe kill in half for the northern Lower Peninsula.

In addition, the State Legislature has forbidden hunters to take does in the entire Upper Peninsula.

hunters turn out in good numbers and are blessed with the kind of weather that spurs whitetail movements.

Just how many deer hunters will tally forth this year is open to speculation. The UAW strike against GM makes figuring in this area a question mark, and it poses an impossible in trying to estimate what the overall deer kill will be.

Last year saw a record 656,853 firearm deer hunters take to the woods. But even if this figure is reached or exceeded, the abbreviated week-end opening day may cut into the total kill.

Some predictions made by DNR experts indicate the hunters won't match last year's figure of 12,250 in the Upper Peninsula, will be shy of 1969's 41,890 animals in the northern Lower Peninsula, but should equal and may even top last season's take of 11,840 bucks in southern Michigan.

A DNR deer specialist predicts some excellent hunting in the farm-belt region. But if it's a trophy you want, a big-racked buck, try the Upper Peninsula or the state's southern area.

IF YOU PLAN to hunt across the straits and into to buy hay or straw, don't make your purchase until after you've crossed the bridge.

Reason? The Michigan Dept. of Agriculture says persons who take unfertilized hay or straw into the UP are violating the cereal leaf beetle quarantine.

"Although the entire Lower Peninsula is under quarantine for this insect pest, the Upper Peninsula has escaped infestation, and we want to keep it that way," a department spokesman explained.

BIRD HUNTERS should be advised that lots of quail are being flushed in Wayne County and the chances of bagging your limit are good during November.

In addition, isolated spots in Macomb and St. Clair Counties are offering pheasant hunters good shooting.

And, waterfowl hunters, don't despair. Some geese have been reported on some Oakland County lakes.

Then it was Kowalski on a 45-yard run to give Glenn an 18-14 lead before Lamb, who gained

HE SCORED three touchdowns and figured in three conversions for a total of 24 points.

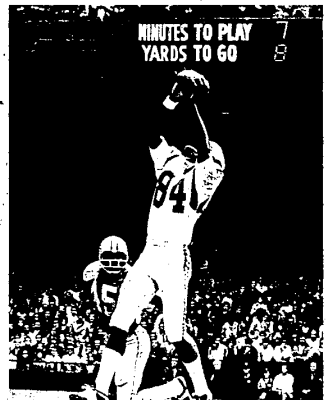
"If we would have had Blazok in perfect shape at the outset, the story might have been much different for us," said St. Agatha Coach Mike Benane.
