"EDITH'S CHOCOLATE PIE"  
3 slices toast made into crumbs  
2 cups butter flavoring  
Mix and press into 8-inch pie pan.  
Sugar substitute and cinnamon to taste  
Lemon juice to moisten  
FILLING:  
1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
3 eggs  
1/4 tsp. salt  
Brown food color  
12 oz. evaporated-skim milk  
2 tsp. chocolate extract  
4 pkgs. sugar substitute  
1 1/2 tsp. vanilla  
Sprinkle gelatin over 1/2 cup milk in saucepan. Beat eggs with remaining milk and add to saucepan. Add remaining ingredients. Stir constantly over low heat until mixture thickens (about 5 minutes). Pour mixture into bowl and chill. Stir occasionally until mixture mounds when dropped from spoon. Beat at high speed until creamy. Pour into crust.
