

Psychological Plays Set By Schoolcraft Players

The Masque Players of Schoolcraft College open their season tonight (Nov. 4) with four one-act plays entitled "The Subconscious Four."

They will also be presented Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings at 8 in the Liberal Arts Theater on the campus.

The four plays are attempts by four different authors to deal with the subconscious.

THE FIRST deals with the beginning of the popularity of psychoanalysis. It is directed by Ken Cyr of Livonia.

The second play, two men and their subconscious beings meet to discuss old times. While the women speak, the subconscious overtones tell the real truth behind the words. This play is directed by Esther Sieracki of Detroit.
