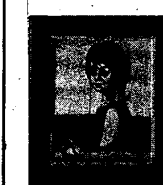

Local Winery Closing; Will End 37-Year Stay

FARMINGTON LaSalle Winery is going out of business in the City of Farmington after doing business for 37 years at its Grand River site.

The winery is now in the process of being "liquidated." When the assets are sold, LaSalle Wines and Champagne, Inc. will no longer be a part of the Farmington business community.

THE BUILDING, which used to be the Detroit United Railway terminal, will be leased for one year to the St. Julian Wine Co., Inc.

St. Julian will occupy the building during the period of liquidation and, conceivably, could negotiate a lease extension to occupy the building on a more permanent basis.

The information that LaSalle

was moving out of Farmington was made public at Monday night's city council meeting. Permission was requested, and granted, to issue a new beer and wine license to St. Julian for the one year occupancy at 3155 Grand River.

LaSALLE WAS founded by Morris Twomey in Ontario. About seven years ago, the winery was sold to Chamberlin of America, a New York based corporation.

Chamberlin of America still owns the building and reportedly does not plan on selling for at least a year.

It should take at least a year to dismantle the large wine vats, the larger ones with a 20,000 gallon capacity, and move out the many gallons of wine now stored there.

It is estimated there are

about one million gallons of wine stored in the basement of the winery in bulk in the vats. The winery, in recent years, was used primarily as a wholesale outlet. This year, the winery did a very limited amount of pressing of wine.

Located in the winery are 30 fermenting vats with an average 6,000-gallon capacity that are filled 8-10 times a year. The winery was one of the largest taxpayers in the city.

IN OTHER action, the city council held a necessity hearing for storm drainage to provide direct benefit to a 28-acre area.

The proposed drainage district would also provide relief to existing drains serving Alta Loma subdivision.

The total area runs from the Rouge River to 9 Mile along

Freedom Drive and up Farmington Rd. between Freedom and Alta Loma.

Besides providing relief to Alta Loma, the project will also provide storm relief to the area where Fleming intersects Freedom near 136 expressway.

THE COUNCIL agreed to meeting with its Planning Commission at 8 p.m. Nov. 18 to hear a report from the commission's Downtown Rd. development Committee (DRC).

The DRC has completed its studies, says Dignan, and is ready to introduce a plan. It hopes will be adopted as part of the overall master plan for the city's central business district.

Dignan also issued a report on the city's annual audit which showed a 1969-70 balance in the general fund of \$7,344.

The city's books were audited by Robert Clarke of Plante & Moran. Within the next two weeks, before the next council meeting, councilmen will be meeting with Clarke to discuss the audit and recommended changes in the city's accounting procedures.

Township Tax Bills Will Be Computerized

FARMINGTON Farmington Township has decided to have its tax bills done on computer and has entered an agreement with Oakland County to do so.

The contract provides that the county will run all of the township's tax bills off on the IBM computer for an initial cost of \$8,000.

After the initial cost is paid, the annual expense of placing tax bills on the county computer will be about \$3,500.

THE TOWNSHIP BOARD, at its last meeting, authorized the expenditure of \$8,000 and agreement with the county.

CAIRNS SAYS it takes about six to eight weeks now to pre-

pare the township's annual tax bills which total about 20,000 statements. The computer can do the same job in a matter of hours, he adds.

New billing machines would cost about \$20,000 apiece, said Cairns while explaining why he felt it would be more economical and efficient to switch the county's computer.

Cairns has been clerk now for some 15 years and said the current billing machines were probably there 15 years before that.

Farmington Public Schools presently have a similar arrangement with the Oakland County Intermediate School District. The county's computer handles the payroll each week for Farmington Schools.
