Blind Student Touches Python

Touching a live python, coyote or kinkajou is a rare experience for most, especially if you happen to be blind like Laura Pappas, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Pappas of Farmington.

Miss Pappas is a junior in the Michigan School for the Blind and was one of 50 girls from 10 schools for the blind in the Midwest who recently visited the Missouri School for the Blind.

While in Missouri, the girls visited the famous zoo in St. Louis and had an opportunity to touch a live python, coyote and kinkajou.

They also visited the Indian-

apolis Speedway and were able to hear the cars being tested and touch parts of some of the first cars ever raced at the speedway in the early 1900s.

Purpose of the St. Louis trip was a girls' Activity Day. The 50 young ladies formed competitive teams in such events as broad jumping, basketball throw, tandem run, suitcase races, rope jumping and a tug-of-war.

Emphasis was on sports, competition and camaraderie but there were also a number of educational experiences reports Miss Joan Brunger, physical education instructor for the trip.

Posthumous Awards Given To Cpl. Selman

Mrs. Deborah S. Selman of 2214 Dresden, Farmington, has accepted posthumous awards of the Bronze Star and Purple Heart Medals for her husband, Army Cpl. Charles Selman who was killed in the Vietnam fighting last April 9.

Major General Shelton E. Lollis, commanding general of the U.S. Army Tank-Automotive Command (TACOM), presented the awards to Mrs. Selman at a ceremony held in his TACOM headquarters office.

Assigned to Company E, 2nd Battalion, 501st Infantry, 101st Airborne Division, Cpl. Selman died as a result of wounds received while on a combat operation when a hostile force was encountered.

Selman attended Clarendonville High School and was employed at Detroit Diesel before entering the service in Aug. 1968. He arrived in Vietnam in February 1970.

In addition to his wife, Todd and by his parents, Mr. Selman, 21, is also survived by a nine-month-old son, Richard, of Farmington address.



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
