A 12-year-old Farmington Hills boy riding his bicycle on 13 Mile near Mulline was hit by a pellet fired from a passing car at 4:15 p.m. June 18.

The boy was hit on the cheek. He received first aid from the Farmington Hills Fire Department, according to a Farmington Hills police report.

Fatal collision investigated

Michigan State Police continue to investigate what caused a three-vehicle accident on I-696 in Farmington Hills that killed one woman and injured nine others June 16.

Teresa Mustain, 26, of Inkster died at Botsford General Hospital, Farmington Hills, after the BMW in which she and six others, including five children, crossed the freeway's grassy median and struck a westbound Pontiac head-on at 4:50 p.m. Trooper Mike Lewis said.

The BMW then spun off the westbound Pontiac and was broadsided

by a van driven by Stephen Nash, 34, of Lakeland. He was treated at Providence Hospital's Novi Center.

Mustain's son, James Maceroni, 4, and the driver of the BMW, Carole Khalife, 25, of Southfield, were admitted to William Beaumont Hospital, Royal Oak.

Khalife's daughter, Lara, 3, was transferred to Mott Children's Hospital, Ann Arbor.

Also in the BMW were Khalife's neighbors, Tiffany Persons, 13, taken to St. Mary's Hospital, Livonia; her brother, Tony, 8, taken to Beau-

mont; and their cousin, Brandi Portwood, 12, of Detroit, taken to Providence Hospital, Southfield.

Riding in the Pontiac were Patricia Lanthier, 52, of Westland and her neighbor, Margaret Mirabaur, 58. They were taken to Providence Hospital in Novi and Southfield, respectively.

No one was listed in critical condition on Friday. No one in the BMW was wearing a seat belt. Those in the other cars were wearing theirs, Trooper Lewis said.

Council will consider enacting an zoning ordinance amendment for creation and membership. They will also consider Northier & Associates' request to speak about 13 Mile Road development.

Also to be considered is a request from the Economic Development Corporation to ask Detroit Edison to bury major electric transmission

lines and towers on Grand River Avenue, as well as an extension paving contract for completion of 13 Mile Road, between Halsted and Haggerty.

Council will consider purchasing microfilm equipment and services, approval of a computer equipment maintenance contract, and purchase of heating and cooling units for the former police building.

Council will consider approving an amendment to the 47th District Court budget and approval of a lease
