

## police/fire calls

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases from the past week:

### CAR TAKEN

A man who asked to test drive a new car at Bob Saks Oldsmobile last week, drove away with the car after tricking the salesman. The incident occurred Oct. 13 at the dealership, 35300 Grand River.

According to a Farmington Hills police report:

The man, thought to be about 30, was in the passenger seat of the 1977 Toronado, valued at \$23,000, when he asked the salesman, who was driving, if he could test drive the car. When the salesman got out of the car to switch seats, the man slid

over into the driver's seat and took off on Drake Road.

Before taking the test drive, the man had arrived at the dealership in a 1985 Ford Bronco, valued at \$15,000, which he apparently took from Roy O'Brien Ford in St. Clair Shores using the same trick.

### LARCENY BY TRICK

A Farmington Hills man was tricked out of \$52.50 by a man disguised as a magazine subscription solicitor.

She is survived by her brother, Francis Wilders of North Merrick, Long Island. She was the sister-in-


