Incumbent Donn Wolf is not seeking re-election after two four-year terms.


Winners will take their seats at the next regularly scheduled council meeting following the election and certification of results by the local

"As a council member, I attend at least three meetings a month and sometimes four. When time permits, I attend other boards and commis-

"When I served as mayor in 1986, I attended as many as 10 meetings per month, sometimes more, and that in addition to meetings with the eity manager weekly. Ceremonial activities were too many to keep track of."

7. Should the city council have a code of ethics? Whhat specific items would you include?
"No. The city charter is quite adequate in that regard. Anything above and beyond the charter provisions is superfluous and not in the best interest of either the city or those who would serve as council members."

"I think the council performance has been very good. The majority of the council has worked well together and has kept the interest of the city uppermost in our minds. During my year as mayor, we had many accomplishments to be pround of. We held public hearings and adopted a marter storry and drainage plan. We adopted a master parks and recreation plan.

we study and state parks and recreations and the state parks and recreation who sturveyed our residents and developed a local roads plan. We adopted a five-year capital improvements plan and we developed five-year plans for fire, police and liberty service. The response to our citizens has been excellent in terms of roads, youth programs, senior citizens programs, home rehabilitation and, last but not least, in 1937, we reduced taxes almost 15 percent. "In my estimation, the council faltered in approving the congregate care housing at 11 Mile and Middle-belt for 294 units. I felt that was too lesser density."

"I have answered this question partially in No. 2. I have researched this issue thoroughly and I am opposed to joining Oaktand County solid waste consortium. We are paying \$11 per ton and they are estimating an initial cost of \$50.555 per ton. My guess is that when the consortium goes into operation, their cost will be closer to \$80 per ton.
"I am an engineer and I have been involved in the design of similar leadilities, and I can speak from experience. I also can refer to other consortiums throughout the country that turned out to be total disaster from an economic point of view.

"I believe our best approach is to

"I believe our best approach is to join forces with Southfield, Farming-ton, Novi, Wixom, Walled Lake, and maybe other communities, and pur-chase our own dumpsite. This study is under way."

11.Do you agree with the city's new policy limiting board and com-mission members to one post? How would you generate publicity to at-

"Generally, I agree that the coun-cil should capitalize on the wide range of talent available in this com-

cil should capitalize on the wide range of talent avaitable in this com-munity to carry on the work of our boards and commissions. At the same time. I would like the council to have the ability to make excep-tions, when appropriate, due to spe-cial qualifications. "I propose that we devote a future city newsletter, solely, to the expla-nation of the work of boards and commissions. I also propose that we establish a formal portfolio of those interested citizens, and keep such of portfolio current for use by future mayors in making their appoint-ments.
