PETRIS ALSO remembers seeing "South Pacilic." "My Fair Lady" and "Camelot" all in the first week of their long runs on Broadway. "It was before so many people discovered what great shows they were." she said. "We were able to just walk off the street, up to the box effice and into the theater. It was wonder-tul. You felt as if you were part of (theater) history in the making. In just a short while after that, of course, tickets couldn't be bought for over or money.

"The last play I saw, "Starlight Express," was a musical. I leved that, too, although I'm not too cray about the new George Gershwin Theatre where I saw it. — it's too much like an office building, and doesn't have that wonderful "magie" I think a theater should have."
