Laura Toy's A Woman
Of Environmental Action

FURTHERMORE, Laura is working on a long-range plan to get established in Livonia a glass collection center for the northwest suburban area so residents who want to do something about pollution won't have to drive to Ann Arbor with their used bottles.

So Laura decided to do something.

Today, because of the effort she began, there is a Livonia Environmental Action Committee, with offices in the Livonia civic center area at Five Mile and Farmington Road.

Her group, which has an official designation of L.E.A.C. and a slogan "To Wait Is Too Late - Stop Pollution" is a going concern ready to launch a glass collection drive Nov. 20 to 22 and Nov. 27 to 29.

"I kept hearing people talk about the pollution problem, but that's all they did," says energetic Laura Toy, who less than a year ago was president of the senior class at Livonia's Bentley High School.

She pointed out that re-using disposable bottles not only cuts litter but also permits recycling for new glass products, bricks, sand or "glassphalt" for pavements.

And when the current glass collection is completed, L.E.A.C. will start a drive to collect old newspapers.

"Every ton of newspaper that is saved and recycled means saving a tree," Laura said.

THE ENVIRONMENTAL Action Committee will be paid a small amount of money for the glass and newspapers collected, Laura said.

"But that's not the important thing," she added, "even though we really do need funds. What we're stressing is the importance of conservation."

Heading the glass drive, Laura said, will be Mrs. Donna Carle of Livonia. Most of the other leaders Laura has recruited also came from the Bentley class of 1970.

Laura, who is a pre-law student at Schoolcraft Community College when she's not working on environmental action, decided last summer that more was needed to

do something about pollution than "just talking."

With a few friends, she went to talk to Livonia Mayor Edward McNamara.

"He was very helpful and gave us the office in the little house in the civic center," she said. Laura then made a point of checking with environmental experts at Wayne State University, the University of Michigan and Michigan State University to learn as much as possible about the problems and action that can be taken.

And Laura's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Toy, are interested in the work.

"This was taking so much time that I had to quit my part-time job," she said. "So they're supporting me while I go to school and work on this project."

CURRENTLY, help has been offered by several Livonia churches, St. Edith's Catholic, St. Paul Lutheran and St. Timothy Presby-

terian. More are expected to get in on the environmental action.

Some of her former classmates who have offered their help are Colleen Siembar, Vicki Ray, Sandy Shouc and Judy Still. David Gill, an attorney, has offered legal services.

The Environmental Action Center now is open from 7 to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday. Laura hopes that she will find more volunteers so it can be opened more hours in the near future.
