Sentenced

Detroit residents will spend lives in prison

Two Detroit residents will spend their lives in prison for the 1987 rob-bery-slaying of a Farmington Hills chauffeur.

Oakland County Circuit Judge Jes-sica Cooper sentenced the two Tues-day in the death of Edward S. Chap-man of Detroit on Feb. 28, 1987 in the parking lot at Hunter's Ridge Apartments.

Chapman was a chauffeur and handyman for an elderly resident of the exclusive Farmington Hills apartment complex on 14 Mile, just west of Orchard Lake Road. He didd of a gunshov wound to the head, the Oxkland County Medical Examiner ruled. ruled.

Following a 7-day trial, Jemai Ed-ward Tipton, 17, and Nellie McInnls, 46, were convicted in October.

A third dofendant, Anthony Jerome Parks, 24, was released af-ter Cooper dismissed a first-degree felony murder charge and acquitted the Detroit resident of armed rob-bery and compiracy to commit armed robbery. Parks had a bench tinit. Parks is Tipton's half-brother. Tipton was sentenced on three convictions: Ille in prison without parole for first-degree felony mur-der; Ille in prison for consepiracy to commit armed robbery; and two years in prison for possessing a fire-arm in the commission of a felony.

MCINNIS WAS sentenced to 20-47 years in prison for compiracy to commit armed robbery. Cooper va-cated the sentence when she ordered McInnis to spend her life in prison for conviction on a habitual olfender charge. "With some of the judge's com-ments made about her rehabilita-

tion, it's doubtful she'll be paroled," said detective Patrick Monti of the Farmington Hills Police Depart-ment.
