

# Motel receipt aids in hunt of Hills man

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"He's obviously fighting deportation," said detective Daniel Krause of the Farmington Hills Police Department.

"He doesn't want to come back now that he's going to prison. It's not going to be quick and simple. We could get him back any time between now and Christmas."

SINISHTAJ WILL likely ask to be deported to his native Yugoslavia. "But it's Canada's policy to ship undesirable aliens back to the country from which they came. And he's recognized in Canada as a U.S. citizen," Krause said.

Krause said he's "fairly certain" Sinishtaj eventually will be deported to the United States — to the custody of the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office and Farmington Hills police.

Sinishtaj was free on \$5,000 bond when he left the Oakland County Courthouse courtroom of Circuit

Judge Richard Kuhn at 11:45 a.m. Nov. 5 for a recess.

All the evidence had been presented when the judge broke for lunch on the second day of a two-day felony trial. When closing arguments began at 2:30 p.m., Sinishtaj had vanished.

At 5:15 p.m., a 12-person jury found him guilty of possession with intent to deliver more than 50 grams of cocaine and of carrying a pistol in a motor vehicle.

Sinishtaj faces a sentence of 10-20 years in prison on the cocaine conviction and up to five years in prison on the weapons conviction. He also faces a habitual offender charge, which could influence sentencing, Krause said.

A BROTHER of Sinishtaj, Martin, and another relative, Frank Camaj, were crossing the border at 1:30 a.m. Friday when a motel receipt was found in their car.

"His brother's last name is Sinishtaj," Krause said.

taj, which is what tipped off customs officials," Krause said. "They were checking the names of everybody crossing the border because we felt he would try to leave the country through Canada."

The motel receipt was current. "That's why we were pretty certain Fran Sinishtaj was at the motel," Krause said.

By this time, Kuhn had signed a bench warrant for Sinishtaj's arrest and Farmington Hills police had sent out a teletype about his disappearance.

Sinishtaj was originally arrested at 2:15 a.m. March 30, 1986, when Farmington Hills police found 150 grams of cocaine, with a reported street value of \$15,000, in a suspicious car parked at Walnut Creek Apartments. Cocaine packaging material and a pistol also were found in the car, Krause said.

ALTHOUGH BOND was only

\$5,000, Sinishtaj had appeared at other court proceedings during the past 19 months. "There was no reason to believe he wouldn't show up for the conclusion of his trial," Krause said.

Krause said Sinishtaj "was aware the trial wasn't going real well and probably felt he'd be convicted and would be looking at a mandatory 10-year minimum sentence."

"He probably felt he had nothing to lose by trying to leave the country," Krause said.

Both Martin Sinishtaj and Frank Camaj were charged with aiding Fran Sinishtaj in his escape. They were arraigned Friday in U.S. District Court in Detroit and released on bond. If convicted, they face up to five years in prison, Krause said.

THIS MARKED the fourth time an accused drug dealer free on bond from Oakland County Circuit Court and facing a long prison term had become a fugitive.

Farmington Department of Public Safety detectives are still searching for Hayden Street resident Daniel William Jamieson.

He was arrested in November 1986 with former Bloomfield Hills Middle School teacher David Michael Schultz of Farmington Hills.

In April, a Circuit Court jury found Schultz, described by friends and family as a man of high character, guilty of delivering 10 ounces of cocaine to an undercover police officer.

Schultz was not involved in the actual sale, but surveillance officers saw him bring a package of cocaine.

with a street value of \$60,000, to the Hayden house just before the sale and subsequent raid, according to prosecution testimony.

Circuit Judge Hilda Gage sentenced Schultz to the mandatory minimum, 20 years in prison.

Jamieson, described by officers as

the main focus of their investigation, is charged with the same felony. He failed to show up for their April trial.

Both Jamieson and Schultz were free on \$10,000 bond at the time. A bench warrant remains for Jamieson's arrest.

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## Walled Lake seeks school millage

Voters in the Walled Lake School District will be asked to approve a millage renewal in an election Monday.

On the ballot is renewal of 15 mills (\$15 per \$1,000 of assessed property value) for operating expenses. If approved, the millage will be in effect through 1997. The renewal represents two separate taxes which expire at the end of 1987, a 10-mill, 10-year levy and a 5-mill, 5-year levy.

Walled Lake district voters earlier

this year turned down a proposal to exempt the district from the Headlee Amendment. Voters said no to allowing the district to fully rely on taxes on property values which rose above the inflation rate.

Interim superintendent Barry Hensborough said the millage renewal funds represented 34.6 percent of the present operating budget, an amount in excess of \$14 million.

"This millage renewal is important," Hensborough said, "to continue facility improvement, class size, ra-

tio of teacher to pupil, athletic programs, transportation, and the general financial progress of the district. The growth of the district and the increased costs of maintenance make this a critical issue."

Election chairman Les Carlson said West Bloomfield Township voters registered within the school district can vote between 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. at specified precincts which include Maple, Twin Beach and Keith elementary schools. To determine the proper precinct, call the school district at 624-4801, Ext. 207.
