Area swimmers go to state

For a handful of elite swimmers, the meet they've been pointing for through months of training is here. On Saturday, they will travel to East Lansing and Michigan State for the Class A state finals.

North Farmington, which has six swimmers qualified, has the best chance for success. Cindy Cramer leads the Raiders. North won the Western Lakes Activities Association title and Cramer contributed two first-place finishes, in the 100-yard freestyle and 100 breaststroke.

Cramer, who also qualified in the 200 individual medley and 50 free, will swim the 100 free and 100 breast. Her best times are 55.18 in the 100 free and 1:09.02 in the 100 breast.

North's Kerry Doran also made the state cut in four events. At the WLA meet, Doran swam the 200 IM and 100 fly. Her best clockings in those two events are 2:18.83 in the IM and 1:00.92 in the fly. She is also qualified in the 500 free and 100 breast.

Other Raiders with a chance to score points at state are Amy Menellay, in the 200 and 500 free (2:31.89 in the 200, 5:25.46 in the 500); Mary Mulberger, in the IM and breast (2:18.48 in the IM, 1:09.47 in the breast); Christie Duthie, in the 50 free and fly (25.9 in the 50, 1:02.10 in the fly); and Laurie Oswald, in the

500 free (5:21.90).

Both of North's relays, the 200 medley and 400 free, will also compete.

PLYMOUTH CANTON should also do well, providing sophomores Cassie Cummings and Nicole Drake swim as they have all season. Cummings will be in the IM (best time: 2:14.34) and 100 back (1:02.23), while Drake competes in the 200 (1:57.48) and 500 (2:09.71) free.

"Nicole's fast enough that she can be in the top two or three in the state in the 500," said Canton coach Hooker Waldman.

Cummings' time in the IM would have placed her in the top six at last year's state finals. "I think she'll go in the high 2:12s this year," said Waldman, which could get her into the top six.

Cummings also has the ability to "go one minute-plus in the 100 back and get in the top three in the state," Waldman added.

Both Cummings and Drake will also be a part of Canton's 400 free relay, with senior Danielle Dickinson and freshman Chris Lang. That relay, too,

could finish in the top 12 and score points.

FARMINGTON HILLS MERCY has four swimmers and divers Marie Olson and Erica Campbell, the Catholic League champion, going to the finals, and two relays.

Becky Wiquist will swim the 200 free (best time: 1:59.50) and 500 free, while Roberta Orr competes in the IM (2:15.64) and 100 back (1:02.96). Cindy Grush will also be in the 500 free (5:25.78), while Katie Westoff swims in the 100 back (1:04.94).

Farmington's medley relay, which finished first in the WLA meet in which the Falcons placed higher than Western Division winner Livonia Churchill, has qualified for state.

Lauren Weary qualified in the 100 fly (59.72) and 100 back (1:05.07), but will be unable to compete after being stricken by mononucleosis. However, Lori Kiel, in the 100 breast (1:15.57), will compete along with Stacy Schalm and Katie Hohl in the medley relay.

Plymouth Salem will be represented by senior Tracy Meszaros at the state final. Meszaros qualified in the 200 IM, with a best clocking of 2:18.99. But to score points at state — which means finishing in the top 12 — Meszaros will have to cut that time.

RECORD SETTER

Dave Quarles, a senior placekicker from Farmington Hills, set a Cornell University scoring record in the Big Red's 31-20 victory over the Columbia Lions on Saturday, Nov. 14.

Quarles, a 1984 graduate of Harrison, broke the 46-point record set last season by Tom Aug. Quarles has accumulated 50 points with season totals of 12 field goals and 14 extra points.

He booted a 45-yard field goal and four PATS in the Columbia game. He also has attempted 20 field goals, surpassing Aug's mark of 17.

Quarles, an engineering major, is the son of Wat and Ellen Quarles, 28187 Brian Hill Rd.

A 13-6 surge over the final 3:38 of the first half carried OU to a 37-32 halftime lead. After that, it was the Sarah Knuth show. The senior forward scored 17 of her game-high 25 points in the second half, including 11 in a 2-3 surge in the first 6:11 after the intermission.

That sealed U-M's fate. Debbie Delie added 14 points (and seven rebounds), Leah Fenwick scored 12, Kim Klein-Green added 11 and Janice Kosman came off the bench to get 10 points and six rebounds.

OU's defense — triggered by Knuth, Delie, Klein-Green and Ann Serra with three steals each — forced 38 U-M turnovers, 22 in the second half. Temple Brown led the Lady Wolverines with 14 points.

On Saturday, the Lady Pioneers captured the Grand Rapids Press Tournament title with an 85-65 victory over Ferris State.

OU trailed 40-38 at the half, but led by Delie — named the tourna-

ment's MVP — the Lady Pioneers outscored Ferris 47-25 over the final 20 minutes.

Delie finished with 21 points, 12 rebounds and four steals. Fenwick got 20 points and seven rebounds. Amy Atkinson added 11 points and Knuth, also chosen to the all-tournament team, finished with nine points and seven boards.

OU'S MENS TEAM had a good and bad day Monday. The good came early, when senior guard Scott Bittinger was named Great Lakes Conference player of the week.

Bittinger won the award on a one-game performance. He scored 44 points on 20-of-31 shooting in OU's triple-overtime win at Northern Michigan. Bittinger got 22 of those in OT, including 10 in the final extra

The bad came that evening for the Pioneers.

Their modest two-game winning streak ended at Eastern Michigan, 117-107.

Huron center Grant Long proved unstoppable. Long scored the first nine points of the game to get EMU off and running. With 3:28 left in the first half, the Hurons led 55-30. A 15-4 closing surge got OU back to 59-45 at the intermission.

The Pioneers eventually pulled to within two, 65-63, with 16:09 left. But EMU went on a 14-5 tear, and the closest OU got after that was seven 112-105 with 1:07 to go.

Long finished with 27 points and 11 rebounds for EMU (now 2-0). Howard Chambers also had 20 points.

OU (2-1) got 27 points from John Henderson, 23 from Bittinger, 22 (and 12 rebounds) from Andre Bond, 20 from Brian Gregory (and 15 assists), and 13 from Pete Schill.
