● HOOP SHOOT

The Southeast District of the Michigan Elks will conduct the finals of its basketball shootout — a free-throw shooting contest in which contestants get 25 attempts apiece — at 10 a.m. Saturday at North Farmington High School.

Boys and girls who already have won district championships and represent 10 local lodges will compete according to the following age groups: 8-9, 10-11 and 12-13.

The winners will go on to the state finals Saturday, Feb. 13, at Oakland Community College.

Thank goodness for Grand Rapids Baptist. The Comets provided Oakland University's mens basketball team with just the break it needed Tuesday.

Behind deadly three-point shooting, the Pioneers romped to a 99-79 triumph at home, which was a nice place to be after a disastrous road trip to the Upper Peninsula last week. OU lost twice in the north country, falling at Lake Superior State 96-94 Saturday and at Michigan Tech 89-88 Thursday.

Against Baptist, OU hit 11-of-18 three-pointers (61.1 percent). Ricky Miller was on fire, canning all five of his three-point attempts and collecting 23 points and six assists. Scott Bittinger had 22 points, John Henderson contributed 15 points and eight rebounds, and Andre Bond and Brian Gregory chipped in 12 points apiece.

Gregory also had 13 assists, six rebounds and four steals. Scott O'Day's 25 points paced the Comets.

IN THE LOSS at Lake Superior State, a Dave Jokisch jumper with four seconds left beat OU. Bond's 24-footer at the buzzer made it.

The Pioneers had a 55-47 lead at the half and were up 70-63 with 12:48 to go, but a 15-4 spur put LSS up for good with 8:41 left. Four Bittinger free throws in the final 50 seconds tied it for OU before Jokisch's game-winner.

Bittinger finished with 31 points on 12-of-16 floor shooting. Gregory had 20 points and 10 assists. Henderson scored 14. Bond added 13 and Wallace Davis grabbed 10 rebounds. Chris Wooley topped LSS with 26 points; Jokisch and John Gilbert had 21 apiece.

At Michigan Tech, OU had a 75-72 lead with 4:40 to play after a Bond three-pointer, but the Pioneers were outscored 17-5 the rest of the way.

Gregory's 27 points was best for the Pioneers. The sophomore guard

also dished out 13 assists to give him 171 for the season, breaking Craig Hines' record of 170 set in 1978-79. Bittinger plucked in 24 points and Bond had 18. Rod Ruth led Tech with 32 points and 15 rebounds.

The two Great Lakes Conference losses dropped OU to 1-2 in the league. The Pioneers are 8-5 overall, with home games against Grand Valley State at 8 p.m. tonight and against Saginaw Valley State at 3 p.m. Saturday.

LSS is 7-5 overall, 1-2 in the conference. Tech is 8-6 overall, 2-1 in the league.

OU NOTES: The Lady Pioneer swimmers improved their dual-meet record to 3-0 with a 102-103 win over visiting Cleveland State Friday. Freshman Lisa Guilfoyle won three events for OU: the 50-yard freestyle (25.12), the 100 breaststroke (1:09.86) and the 200 breast (2:33.40).

Kristi Spicer and Nancy Schermer added two wins apiece for the Lady Pioneers. Spicer's wins came in the 100 (1:05.10) and 200 (2:22.25) backstroke, while Schermer doubled in the 200 (2:35.72) and 1,000 (11:05.43) freestyle.

OU hosts Wright State Friday and Grand Valley State Saturday.

OCC women win 14th without loss

As Oakland Community College women basketball coach Larry Hojns saw it, "That was probably the best defensive first half we've played all year."

Considering the Lady Raiders limited Delta CC to just 12 points, that's a fair assessment. But they scored 25 themselves — hardly a great offensive performance for a team unbeaten through 13 games.

Not to worry. "We came out smoking in the second half," said Hojns, as OCC ripped to an 80-45 victory at Delta Saturday.

"There was a little constructive criticism at halftime," the OCC coach explained after his team improved to 14-0 overall and 4-0 in the Eastern Conference. "We started working the ball inside to Michelle Taubee and Regina Woodward for some easy baskets."

TAUBEE, WOODWARD (from Bloomfield Hills Lakes and Shelley Duncan controlled the area under the basket. Taubee finished with 19 points and seven rebounds, Woodward got 14 points and 21 boards and Duncan collected 13 points and 11 rebounds.

Kristi Lyons and Lisa Kline contributed 10 points apiece for the Lady Raiders. Connie White was best for Delta (1-3 in the conference, 5-8 overall) with 11 points. Jan. 6 OCC ripped St. Clair CC 69-57. The Lady Raiders were up 34-26 at the half and increased that to as many as 21 in the second half. Woodward's 26 points and 23 rebounds led OCC. Duncan added 20 points and 12 boards.

OCC hosts Highland Park CC Saturday in a meeting between two unbeaten Eastern Conference teams.

Hawley nets 41 points

Steve Hawley continues to find the three-point shot to his liking.

The 6-foot-2 freshman guard from Westland John Glenn scored a career-high 41 points, making 11 of 16 three-pointers, lifting Schoolcraft College to a 90-60 men's basketball win Monday over Madonna College.

Hawley scored 19 first-half points and added 22 in the second half to lead the Ocelots, now 8-9 on the season.

Brad Ridgeway, a 6-9 center from Farmington Harrison, added 22 points and 11 rebounds.

LaDon Tait (Belleville) and Mark Clairborn (Wayne Memorial) added eight points each.

Bryan Daniel and Tim Taylor scored 20 and 19, respectively, for Madonna, which slipped to 3-5 overall. Marcus Little added 13 points for the visitors, who led 44-43 at the half.

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**CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS
SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS
REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING
JANUARY 11, 1988**

Mayor Sorenson opened the regular meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council on January 11, 1988 at 7:30 p.m. Members present: Alkateeb, Dolan, Fox, Marks, Sorenson, Proctor, Sorenson, Mayor Sorenson and Vagstad. Others present: City Manager Costick, City Clerk Reynolds, Assistant City Manager Call, Director of Public Services Blaisell, and City Attorney Bibeau.

Council approved the minutes of December 21, 1987, as amended, and minutes of January 4, 1988, as published.

Council enacted Ordinance No. C-1-88, Zoning Map Amendment No. 26-9-87, in the SW 1/4 of Section 28, 35140 Freedom, between Drake and Gill Roads, to rezone from RA-1 to RD-1.

Council enacted Ordinance No. C-2-88, Zoning Map Amendment No. 29-9-87, in the NW 1/4 of Section 3, south side of Fourteen Mile Road, east of Farmington Road, to rezone 33-3-101-002 from RA-1 to OS-1.

Council enacted Ordinance No. C-3-88, Zoning Map Amendment No. PC-31-10-87, in the NW 1/4 of Section 3, south side of Fourteen Mile Road, east of Farmington Road, to rezone from RA-1 to OS-1.

Council enacted Ordinance No. C-4-88 regarding Parks • Rules and Regulations (Amendment to Chapter 15).

Council set date of February 15, 1988 for public hearing to vacate Ravine Street from Orchard Lake Road to Westfield.

Council received information regarding the Michigan Municipal League Regional IV meeting to be held in Sterling Heights on January 23, 1988 and its Annual Legislative Conference scheduled to be held in Lansing on February 24, 1988.

Council agreed to have the Historic District Commission prepare a report on the feasibility of putting the Spier House in the City's Historic District, with additional suggestions for utilization.

Council agreed to hold an executive session to discuss acquisition of property immediately following the meeting.

Council authorized City Manager to issue a purchase order to New Hudson Fence Company, Inc. of Novi, Michigan in the amount of \$36,400.03 for purchase of services and materials for fencing and backstop installation for park improvement program.

Council adopted Traffic Control Order No. PARK-1-1988, establishing a 16 m.p.h. speed limit for all roadways within City owned public parks.

Council adopted Resolution No. 1, establishing the boundary of the special assessment district for road improvement for Elyria Drive, and Resolution No. 2, setting date of February 15, 1988 for a determination hearing.

Council agreed to participate of the Farmington Hills Police Department in a State of Michigan grant to fund the Southeast Michigan Drug Conspiracy Investigation Unit and replace the officer provided to the Unit.

Council adopted resolution authorizing City Engineer to sign permits on behalf of the City that are required by the Wayne County Road Commission.

Council announced presentation of the play, "The Right to Bear Arms," at 3:00 p.m. on January 24, 1988, Building J, Room 234, Oakland Community College, sponsored by the Farmington Area Committee on the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution.

Council directed City Manager to survey other cities regarding their willingness to participate in Mayor's Exchange Day on May 16, 1988.

Council appointed Ben Marks to serve as liaison to the Farmington Board of Education.

Meeting adjourned at 9:25 p.m.
