Planning board seat opens

Longtime commissioner Charles Bridges resigned his seat on the Farmington Planning Commission at the conclusion of the group's regular meeting Jan. 11.

Commissioner Shirley Richardson resigned in 1986 after being appointed to the city council and was re-

placed by Nancy Lawton; commissioner James Abernethy resigned last June and was replaced by James Mitchell.

Planning commissioners are appointed by the city council. It is a nine-member board.

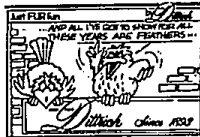
