## Yule Spirit Abounds In All Plymouth Area

Any stranger in Plymouth at this time of year would have to admit that the town is lighted up like an old fashioned Christmas tree.

Both the downtown business district and the rejuvenated Old Village in the Starkweather-Spring-Liberty-Mill area show full evidence that Santa Claus soon will be visiting homes around the world to bring happiness to millions of youngsters.

Private homes throughout the Plymouth community, as well as our business places, soon will be aglow, too, with lights and decorations as the yule spirit spreads among our citizens.

Santa officially arrived in town Friday night to the excited greeting of hundreds of little folk as well as governmental and business leaders at Kellogg Park. Saturday evening he was to officiate at his second tree-lighting ceremony, this one in Old Village.

THE CHRISTMAS committee of the Chamber of Commerce has arranged that Santa will be in Kellogg Park or Old Village every weekday through Dec. 24 from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. as well as from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Fridays.

The calendar of events planned for the community is the busiest in history and these will be the holiday highlights:

Friday, Dec. 4 — Community Carol Sing and dedication of the new Nativity scene at 7:30 p.m. in Kellogg Park, sponsored by the Ministerial Association and Council of Churches.

Saturday, Dec. 5 — Special arrangements for shopping by children to be provided in most stores all day. In addition, stores will display posters on "What Christmas Means To Me" prepared by students through the art department of Plymouth public schools.

Sunday, Dec. 6 — Christmas concert by the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra at 4 p.m. in Central School, Main at Church. Admission is free.

SATURDAY, DEC. 12 — Christmas Berry Market from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Grange Hall on Union Street. This has been arranged by the Plymouth branch of the National Garden Club and admission will be 50 cents.

Saturday, Dec. 19 — Children from the Plymouth State Home and Training School will be special guests of the Penn Theater, sponsored by Plymouth Jaycees.

Sunday, Dec. 20 — From 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. in Kellogg Park awards will be presented by the Jaycees for the best home and store decorations and for the three best "What Christmas Means To Me" drawings. There will be entertainment by choral groups and by the Community Band.

Sunday, Jan. 3 — Twelfth Night Services will be held on the athletic field behind Central School (the old Plymouth High School) with carol singing led by massed church choirs. This is scheduled for 6 p.m. and will be climaxed by a Christmas tree burning supervised by the Plymouth fire department. Householders may leave their discarded trees at the field that day.
