

### Top teams take top gymnastics honors

ToT SURPRISINGLY, Plymouth Canton and North Farmington, with the best gymnasties teams in Observerland, filled half of the 12 positions on this year's All-Area squad.

Canton, which finished ninth in the state, was accorded four first-team berths, and North Farmington, which won its 11th consecutive league title and placed 11th in the state, put two gymnasts on the elite team as did Plymouth Salem and Westland John Glenn.

While their teams were not as strong as the Chiefs and Raiders, John Glenn probably had the best one-two combination in Angie Temelko and Debble Williams, and Farmington's Jackie Daly was certainly one of the premier performers of 1988.

In addition, Temelko and Williams are both first-team repeaters along with Mary Jo Charron, one of the Canton foursome.
