Hills to participate in '88 Rouge cleanup

Farmington Hills will take part in Rouge River Rescue '88, "a day in which public attention is focused on cleanup and the recreational potential of the Rouge River," according to a city council resolution.
The city, in conjunction with the Friends of the Rouge, will sponsor a morning cleanup of a portion of the

Rouge Saturday, June 4.
The Rouge River Watershed Basin is home to 1.5 million citizens in Wayne, Oakland and Washtenaw counties — 11 percent of the state's population.
The river is a major natural feature that provides recreational op-

portunities, fish and wildlife habitat, flood relief water for industrial use, and a transportation route for Great Lakes freighters.
"The water quality of the Rouge River is extremely poor, thereby posing a health and safety problem and hindering enjoyment of this resource by the public," the resolution

reads.
The annual Rouge River Rescue grew out of a 1985 resolution by the state's Water Resources Commission declaring the Rouge "an extremely valuable resource" and making a commitment to restore the river to a condition where its full potential can be realized."
