

Co-op leads him to internship

A college diploma and corporate as well as public accounting experience will make the job search much easier for Patrick LaFave of Farmington Hills after he graduates from Madonna College in May. "I am gaining practical experience at the international CPA firm of Seidman and Seidman as a tax intern," LaFave said. "In the competitive field of accounting, the hands-on experience

puts you one step ahead of the competition." Although working in public accounting at Seidman and Seidman, LaFave has added to his knowledge of corporate accounting at General Motors Corp. in the accounts payable and cost departments, where he had four co-ops over a three-year period. "I chose Madonna College because it has a cooperative education program. My brother, a 1984 graduate

of Madonna College in the criminal justice program, continues to speak highly of the experience he gained via co-op," LaFave said. With such enthusiasm, it's not surprising that LaFave, along with two other Madonna College students, participated in a promotional videotape about the benefits of the cooperative education program at Madonna, shot on location at each student's job placement.

LaFave is quick to add that his accounting experience is not the only advantage of his co-ops: "I've learned how to deal with people and how to interact with them in a work environment." "The benefits to the student as well as the employer are endless. I would advise all students to enrich their college experience through cooperative education."

For filmmaker Pamela Conn, receiving an Oscar was a terrific experience. "It was like dying and going to heaven and hitting an earthquake on the way," said Conn, a Plymouth resident. Winning an Oscar makes all the hard work worthwhile. "You could say that," Conn said. "More than worthwhile. It's like what hard work is." For filmmaker Sue Marx, winning the Oscar Monday night was "almost the best thing that ever happened to me." Marx and her filmmaking partner, Conn, received an Academy Award

for their film, "Young at Heart." The two won the Oscar in the best documentary short subject category. "It feels wonderful," Detroit's Marx said Tuesday. She described the Oscar as "heavy." "It weighs 9 pounds and someone said it's worth \$15,000. It's not getting packed." AS MIGHT be expected, Marx and Conn were enthusiastic about having won the Oscar. The Academy Awards were presented Monday night at a ceremony in Los Angeles. The filmmakers traveled to California for the event. "We were told we had a good chance," Conn said Tuesday afternoon. Although they'd been told that, the women didn't know for sure they'd win.

"We were completely shocked when we won," Conn said. "The experience was great, that's all I can tell you," Marx said. "Almost the best thing that ever happened to me." "The best thing was getting married, having three children was next and then this is it." On Tuesday morning, Marx wasn't giving too much thought to what comes next. "I don't know. On to feature films, perhaps." Conn agreed feature films could be in the future. "I just plan on being happy for a while." The documentary "Young at Heart" is about Marx's father, octogenarian Louis Gotheil, and his late-in-life marriage to Reva Shwayder.

The documentary tracks their love story, starting on a trip they took to England. The documentary includes footage of their garden wedding. A number of scenes are set in Detroit-area locales. "The couple are artists who live in Franklin." Conn was looking forward to her scheduled Wednesday night return to the Detroit area. "Sure I am. I can't wait. It's going to be great." On Tuesday, Conn hadn't given much thought to what message she'd like to send to her hometown. "Hoorry for Hollywood, I guess." And although she's enjoyed being in California, Conn is looking forward to coming back to Plymouth. "I'm really glad I'm from there."

ORDINANCE NO. C-556-88
AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 5.98 OF CHAPTER 39 AND SECTION 5.317 OF CHAPTER 40 OF TITLE V OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON
THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:
CHAPTER 39, Section 5.98, Table of Required Off Street Parking Spaces as follows:

Use	Spaces	Per Unit Measurement
Banks and other financial institutions	(1)	Each 100 sq. ft. of usable floor area within customer service-teller area, and (1) for each 200 sq. ft. of usable floor area within other office areas
Banks and other financial institutions with drive-in tellers	(1)	(6) waiting spaces for the first drive-in teller and (3) for each additional teller or station

CHAPTER 40, Section 5.317, Adoption of Plan as follows:
The Commission may adopt the plan as a whole by a single resolution or may by successive resolutions adopt successive parts of the plan, said parts corresponding with major geographical sections or divisions of the City or with functional subdivisions of the subject matter of the plan, and may adopt any amendment or extension thereof or addition thereto. Before the adoption of the plan or any part, amendment, or addition, the Commission shall hold at least one (1) public hearing thereon, notice of the time and place of which shall be given not less than fifteen (15) days prior to such hearing, by one (1) publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the City, and by registered United States mail to each public utility company operating within the geographical section or division of the City affected, and by first class United States mail to persons contained in the tax records of the City as owners of real property within 300 feet of the premises considered for a change in the Master Plan. The adoption of the plan shall be recorded on the map and shall be subject to the approval of the Commission. The affirmative votes of not less than six (6) members of the Commission. The resolution shall refer expressly to the maps and descriptive and other matter intended by the Commission to form the whole or part of the plan, and the action taken shall be recorded on the map and plan and descriptive matter by the identifying signature of the chairman and/or secretary of the Commission. An attested copy of the plan or part thereof shall be certified to Council and to the County Register of Deeds.
This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on March 22, 1988, was adopted and enacted at the regular meeting of the City Council on April 4, 1988 and will become effective ten (10) days after publication.

Council introduced Zoning Text Amendment, Section 60.08, to amend the density, design standards, site plan submittal requirements and conditions for Cluster Qualifications (One-Family Clustering Option).
