## Salvage operations save utility money

Detroit Edison customers saved \$20 million in 1987 thanks to a company reclamation and salvage program that also provided jobs for about 40 handicapped Goodwill Industries workers.

"Savings from salvage operations in 1987 were the second-biggest in the 67-year program," said Burkhard Schneider, senior vice president energy marketing and distribution for Detroit Edison.

He said total cost savings during that period have been \$412 million, more than half of which has been realized since 1975.

With salvage operating expenses of \$2.3 million, Detroit Edison spent only 14.4 cents for each dollar's worth of material salvaged or returned to stock.

As they have since 1941, Goodwill employees participated in the Detroit Edison salvage program that benefits both them and the company.

"IN ADDITION to being an important part of our company's cost-cutting effort, the salvage program provides jobs in which handicapped people can earn money and learn the skills and attitudes that help them support themselves," said Schneider. Goodwill employees performed 600 salvage jobs at Detroit Edison's Warren Service Center on West War-

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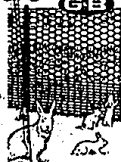
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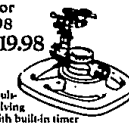

### NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARINGS ON INCREASING PROPERTY TAX AND PROPOSED OPERATING BUDGET

Pursuant to Public Act No. 5 of 1982 and Public Act No. 43 of 1963 (2nd Ex. Sess.), the Board of Education of Clarenceville School District will conduct public hearings on increasing property taxes for operating expenses and the proposed operating budget for 1988-1989. The hearing will be held:

at 7:30 p.m.

The authorized rate for operating millage in the District is 37.90 mills. Public Act No. 5 of 1982 would limit the levy to 35.55 mills. Section 31 of article 9 of the Michigan Constitution would limit the levy to 36.87 mills.

Subject to confirmation by the electorate to authorize the millage levy without respect to the limitations of section 31 of article 9 of the Michigan Constitution at the annual election on June 13, 1988, the Board has the complete authority to levy 37.90 mills. Subject to such electorate approval, the Board of Education intends to levy 37.90 mills for operating purposes. Revenues for operating purposes from ad valorem property tax levies would be increased by 10.51%.

However, due to the present state aid formula, the increase in operating revenues from ad valorem taxes will be offset by a decrease in state aid to the School District.

Copies of the 1988-1989 budget are available for inspection at the offices of the Board of Education.

The public is invited to attend the hearings.
