A 'CALL' for helpairs this week

When people face unemployment, they are often unaware of the diversity of services available in their community to assist them. Now, the organizers of a telephone referral program have developed a program that can guide unemployed individuals in finding the particular assistance they need.

"Community Assistance for Loss in Livelihood" (CALL) is a telephone hotline sponsored by various private and public agencies.

Representatives of CALL programs serving three regions of the state explain the CALL service on the Michigan Employment Security Commission's cable television program "The Job Show," which airs the week of May 23 Linda Stortz is CALL referral specialist in Oakland County.

CALL staff members refer callers to the appropriate agency that can help the unemployed with medical, dental and utility bills, rent or mortgage payments, food needs, job retraining programs and even legal assistance.

Stortz, who lost a job she had held for 20 years when the Inland General Motors Division in Tecumseh closed, said of the callers, "I've walked those shoes. I know what's

happened. I can feel for them."

Stortz said the help doesn't end with the initial phone call, either. On some occasions CALL staff members contact the appropriate agency

on behalf of the unemployed individual. Staffers also follow up to ensure the individuals received the kind of help they required.

SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS
REGULAR CITY COUNCIL PUBLIC HEARING
MAY 16, 1988**

Mayor Sorenson opened the regular public hearing meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council on May 16, 1988 at 7:30 p.m. Members present: Mayor Sorenson, Mayor Pro-Tem Sever, Alkateeb, Dolan, Fox, Marks, and Vagnotski. Others present: City Manager Costick, City Clerk Reynolds, Assistant City Manager Call, Director of Public Services Blasek, Planning Consultant Coates, and City Attorney Hibeau.

Council approved the agenda, as amended.

Council approved request for One-Family Cluster Option development in RA-1 Zoning, Cluster Site Plan 108-108-7, in the SE ¼ of Section 7.

Council adopted Assessment Roll (Resolution No. 5) for the Drake Road Paving Project between Eleven Mile Road and I-696, S.A.D. C-218.

Council approved Introduction of Zoning Map Amendment, Zoning Request No. 4-2-88, in the NE ¼ of Section 18, 27685 Halsted, west side of Halsted between Twelve Mile and Enterprise Ct., to rezone from RA-1 to OS-4.

Council approved Introduction of Zoning Map Amendment, Zoning Request No. 4-2-88, in the W ¼ of Section 6, 37100 Hagerty Road, east side of Hagerty between 13 and 14 Mile Roads, to rezone from RP-2 to RC-2.

Council approved Introduction of Zoning Map Amendment, Zoning Request No. PCZB 6-3-88, in the SW ¼ of Section 8, 37588 Twelve Mile Road, northeast corner of Twelve Mile and Halsted, to rezone from B-1 to OS-1.

Council approved request of Independence Hills Homeowners Association for landfill permit for berm construction on the east side of Drake Road between Old Homestead and Witherspoon.

Council approved rezoning of a portion of Burbank Avenue in Section 11, NW corner of Lot 14, Oakland Hills Orchards (V-5-1988).

Council adopted Resolution for expanded right-of-way for Twelve Mile Road between Farmington and Hagerty Road.

Council agreed to place possible amendment of Section 3.02.C. (Eligibility and Filing Procedure) of the City Charter on the August, 1988 primary ballot.
