## Mercy defense halts Falcons

Coach Ed Bartram and his Farmington soccer players developed a healthy respect for Farmington Mercy's defense after the teams collided Wednesday.

In a showdown between two of the area's elite clubs, the Marlins nullified Farmington's potent offense and got some offensive punch of its own to win the key district tournament game, 6-2, at Mercy.

The Falcons stunned the host team early when Carrie Maier opened the scoring, but the Marlins recovered and didn't allow another goal until building a comfortable lead.

"I figured we'd have problems with their defense, but never anything like that," Bartram said. "I thought we could score, but, like anything else, the kids have to do it."

"THE KIDS PLAYED their hearts out, but I guess Mercy wanted it more."

Mercy, 10-1-1, certainly played with defensive tenacity, and freshman Dana Lehmkuhl was the perfect complement at the opposite end of the field.

Lehmkuhl had the most productive day of her young career, scoring four goals and, with each ensuing one, shutting the door a bit more on the Falcons, who finish with an 8-6 record.

"I was just hoping for me," said Lehmkuhl, an opportunist who was in the right spot at the right time for two goals. "That's my job, to be there."

But the key was Mercy's defense, led by senior Stacy Nolla, and the focus of that effort was the job the Marlins did at keeping Farmington's star forwards, Carrie Maier and Amy Trunk, out of the picture for much of the game.

"I TOLD THE KIDS, (The Farmington players) are such good ball handlers, don't stand back and watch them; get up in their faces. And we had the most success when we did that."

"When we gave up that early goal, that really concerned me, because they are such a good offensive team."

The Marlins had their troubles scoring goals during the regular season, but nobody would have guessed that Wednesday, thanks in large part to Lehmkuhl, whose arcing shots from the left wing gave Mercy a 2-1 lead.

Lehmkuhl slipped past the defender marking her and lifted a shot that went through the fingertips of Farmington goalie Debrah Westerkamp, who had her arms raised to get the ball but couldn't quite reach it.

The momentum swung to the Marlins with that, and Westerkamp stopped a hard shot by Karen Baldus before Lehmkuhl broke the 1-1 tie in the same manner, the ball finding its way between the goalie's hands and the top of the net.

"FARMINGTON IS a super offensive team, and they seem to win games by staying on the offensive attack," Fogel said. "Our strategy was to make a short pass, a short pass and then a long pass to keep the pressure on their wings, and it seemed to work today."

Farmington probably had more potential opportunities in the first half, but Mercy managed to cover up well in front of its goal whenever the

Falcons made a rush. The result was a 2-1 half-time lead.

Kathy McDonald capitalized on some confusion in front of the Farmington goal to make it 3-1 early in the second half. Westerkamp came out to gather in a loose ball, but McDonald hurried up and punched it past her.

"On the sideline, it looked like she was coming out and the forward happened to get in her face, she flinched and the ball bounced off her," Fogel said.

"It was one of those times when it was better to be lucky than good."

SUE MARSHALL MADE it 4-1, but Margaret Martin's hard roller angled its way toward the left corner of the Mercy goal and kept the Falcons hopes alive with 20 minutes still to play.

Mercy's defense continued to hold, however, and the Marlins eventually put the game out of reach.

Westerkamp deflected shots by Michelle Geyer and Erica James, but Lehmkuhl was there to score off the second rebound. With four minutes remaining, Lehmkuhl beat a diving Westerkamp to put the final tally at 6-2.

Mercy, besides putting itself in position to win its first district title in the five-year history of its program when it played Saturday in the final, enhanced its own image by beating a quality Western Lakes team, recognized as the premier league in the state.

"Farmington plays in such a tough league I was worried about being able to stay with them for 80 minutes," Fogel said. "I knew we could play for 40 or 60 minutes. I'm so happy for the kids; they've worked so hard."

## Hawk trackmen fall point shy

The battle for the Western Division boys dual-meet track and field title went down to the wire Wednesday, with Livonia Churchill literally edging Farmington Harrison.

The decisive meet couldn't have been any closer or more exciting as the Chargers, who finished 5-0, nipped the Hawks 68-68 on the Harrison track. The host team ended up 4-1 in the division and 5-1 overall.

Churchill actually clinched the victory when Don Montgomery, who earlier won the 1,600-meter run, added the 3,200 race to his tally sheet.

The Hawks closed to within a point when Wes Wood, Chad Burgess, Chris Hart and Aaron Yavarski won the 1,600 relay in 3:31.0.

"Obviously, they whipped us in the skill events," Harrison coach John Schumacher said.

But the Hawks countered by winning three relays and all but the two distance runs.

Churchill won four of the five field events and the hurdles. Jason Bealre was first in the high jump (6-4), the high hurdles (14-8) and the inter-

mediate hurdles (39-8).

Brian Soeder had Harrison's lone victory in the field events, leaping 19 feet, 3 inches to take the long jump. Schumacher singled out Yavarski, Hart and sophomore Dave Foss, who "ran real good races for us" in the 1,600 and 3,200, for their contributions.

Yavarski chalked up wins in the 100 and 200 dashes with times of 11.1 and 23.2. Hart won the 400 contest in 53.3 and Burgess the 800 run in 2:01.0.

The Hawks' Bob Conlon, Bob Beauchamp, Wood and Yavarski posted a 1:55.0 time to win the 800 relay, and Burgess, Hart, Pat Runk and Foss gave Harrison first in the 3,200 relay with an 8:41.0 time.

FARMINGTON 79, W.L. CENTRAL 80. The Falcons swept the relay Wednesday and closed out their dual-meet campaign by keeping their Walled Lake opponent winless in the Lakes Division.

Farmington, 5-2 in the division and 4-2 overall, dominated the field events and got double wins from Nick Malsel in the sprint.

Bill Lindbert won the high jump (6-0), Mike Neal the discus (140-11), Jason

Wright the long jump (19-4) and Doug MacLeod the pole vault (12-0).

Malsel, in addition to anchoring the 800 relay, won the 100-meter dash in 11.7 and the 200 race in 24 seconds flat.

Farmington's only other non-relay win saw Ron Smedley capture the 1,600 run in 4:54.4.

Joe Crow, Wes Tarkington, Matt Walter, Steve Walter and Tom Hundi were on more than one of the relay teams.

In the 400, it was Matt Nichols, Wright, Crow and Tarkington running 48.04, and Crow, Lindbert, Tarkington and Malsel won the 800 in 2:15.5.

The Walter brothers opened in back-to-back fashion in the other relays. Matt Smedley and Hundi finished in the 1,600 (3:28.3), Hundi and Eric Crawford capped the 3,200 (8:37.9).

STEVENSON 75, N. FARMINGTON 66. Warren Johnson won two events and anchored the winning 1,600-meter relay team for the Raiders, who finish 1-3 in the Lakes Division and 1-7 overall.

Johnson took first place in the long jump (20-6) and 100 dash (11.7), and he followed Jordy Greenstein, Tom Harden and Joe Schmidt in the relay, the Raiders winning in 3:41.1.

Other North winners were Chad Henry in the high jump (5-10), Alan Ferrera in the pole vault (11-0) and Craig Stowe in the 800 run with a time of 2:11.2.
