2Big GOP Names Seek Seats On Oakland Board

Two big Republican names in Oakland County seek election to the newly revamped Board of Supervisors in November as representatives of the two districts including Farmington,

Both are expected to win,
DeLos Hamlin, the current
chairman of the County Board,
and GOP ultra-conservative
Christian Powell seek election to the newly created posts,

Democrats facing the "big guns" are Gerald Freedman and Michael J. Kelly, respectively. Reapportionment reduced the

number of members of the county board to 27.

TWO DISTRICTS Include

2 In Race For Seat On Court

Although there are 16 counties in the Michigan Court of Appeals' second district, the two candidates who will face each other in November in a nonpartisan race for a new position on the bench both are Oakland County resi-

They are S. Jerome Bronson, 38, of Oak Park, who is the county's present prosecuting attorney, and John F. Foley, 40, of Birmingham. Foley currently is a com-missioner of the same court be seeks to serve as judge.

In the three-man primary, Bronson and Foley ran well ahead of Gov. George Romney's legal ad-visor, Robert Danhof, of East Lansing, to become finalists in the battle for the \$32,500-a-year judgeship.
Expansion of the court was ap-

proved this year by the legisla-ture, with one judge being added in each of the state's three districts.

The second district includes these 15 counties in addition to Oakiand:

Huron, Tuscola, Sanilac, Shiawassee, Genessee, Ingham, La-peer, St. Clair, Livingston, Ma-comb, Jackson, Washtenaw, Hills-

comp. Jackson, washienaw, fills-dale, Lenawee and Monroe, Before being appointed to his present position, Foley was in private law practice and was a hearing officer for the Michigan office of the National Labor Relations Board,

Bronson also engaged in the pri-vate practice of law before making his bid for the county prosecutor's job in 1964 when he became the first Democrat elected to that post in 30 years,

Pray For People

Hamilin and Freedman are running in the 17th District, while
Powell and Kelly square off in the 18th District.

HAMI, IN WAS first appointed to the County Board 26 years ago as the City of Farmington's representative. He is currently serving his 12th consecutive term as chairman of the board.

He has also served on the Farmington City Council and as mayor

of the city. - Freedman, a Detroit lawyer, is chairman of the Farmington Demo-crats. A graduate of Wayne State University, he is a member of the township's salary and pension

committee, Powell, a West Bloomfield justice of the peace, has been aleader in the anti-Romney forces in the Oakland County GOP for the past two years.

Kelly is a Detroit lawyer who unsuccessfully filed for Recorders Court judge in Detroit two years

RAYMOND L. BAKER

Ray Baker Seeks New House Term

Incumbent State Rep. Raymond L. Baker (R-Farmington) will seek his fifth term in the Michigan House of Representatives in November. His challenger is Democrat

Leonard P. Baruch, a librarian for the Detroit Board of Education. Baruch unsuccessfully opposed Baker in 1966.

The 64th District includes all of Farmington City and Township, all of West Bloomfield Township, the City of Keego Harbor and part of the City of Southfield. Baker is a pharmacist by pro-fession and is the only pharma-

cist currently serving in the Michigan House.

He is chairman of the House committee on conservation and recreation and is also a member of the liquor control, insurance and youth committees,

Baruch, a graduate of Wayne State University, is currently the treasurer of the Southfield Public Library Board. In addition to his duties for the Detroit schools, he is president of the Baruch-Sandweiss Camp, Inc. in Petoskey and president of the American Education Development Co.
