Crisis in foreign affairs, from the continuing death and destruction in Vietnam to the Russian tanks in the streets of Prague; Crisis on our streets and in our daily lives as violence and crime wage a growing contest with the forces of law and order: Crisis in our economy, from the declining spending power of the average citizen to the increasing effects of strikes by public

employees; • Crisis in our metropolitan areas, as answers are sought for the housing, job and educational needs of growing numbers of urban and suburban dwellers.

These and other crises also make 1968 a year of decision.

FOR THIS IS an election year, a time when the American citizen of voting age can help determine the course of his public institutions in the immediate future. On Nov. 5, some 3.8 million' 2 registered Michigan voters will be eligible to help make that determination.

Without question the most important single decision will be the selection of our nation's leadership for the next four years. The Republican Party has nom-

former Vice-President Richard M. Nixon for the pres-idency and Maryland Governor Spiro Agnew for the vice-presidency.

As a team, they offer the American people the only opportunity to significantly change the potentially disastrous foreign and domestic policies of the present administration. If our policies are wrong, as I believe they are, then it seems reasonable that a change is in order.

AT THE STATE level, this election breaks with the past. As a

result of the four-year terms corded by our new State Constitution, this is the first even-year election devoid of races for governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state and attorney general. There is also no election this year in Michigan for the United States
