City Hires New DPW Director

The City of Farmington has recruited an ex-pert in Senior Citizen housing as its new Depart-ment of Public Services (DPS) director replacing Under the Completed two senior citizen apartment buildings. Jones was also chairman of the Livonia

George Vondrack. David L. Jones. Vondrack's replacement, has helped plan the construction of senior citizen lowcost apartments in the City of Livonia and Escanaha

Jones was approved by the Farmington City Council Monday night as the city's DPS director to replace Vondrack who left Farmington Monday to become city manager for Hart, Mich.

JONES HAS lived in the Farmington-Livonia area for 47 years and is a graduate of Farmington Senior High School. He spent eight years on the administrative taam of Livonia Mayor Harvey Meolke as assist-ant director of public works. Jones left Livonia last April I following Moelke's loss to Edward McNamara in the Livonia mayor's race. In Livonia, Jones supervised almost 50 em-Jores later

In Livenita, doues supervised annost so em-ployes in the water, sewer and sanitation divi-sions. As president of the Livenia Housing Com-mission, Jones assisted in formulating plans for construction of two senior citizen apartment buildings.

One 81-unit apartment has already been completed and the second is now under construction. In Escanaba, he served as executive director of

Building Authority which has acquired land for municipal purposes. Contracts have now been signed with the architects for Livonia's new city

WHILE IN Livonia. Jones also served as a member of the Housing Law Code Board of Ap-peals and belonged to the Community Facilities committee of the National League of Cities.

During his Livonia tenure, Jones assisted in federal aid programs for Open Space grants, the city golf course, and a \$700,000 planning grant for

sanitary sewers. After attending University of Michigan. Jones served in China with the U.S. Marines. After moving to Livonia. he became active in community service work and was elected presi-dent of the Livonia Taxpayers Association.

Jones later was elected to the Livonia City Council and served as chairman of the council's financial and building committees. He is married and has two children, daughter Judith Ann and son Richard David who is attend-

ing Central Michigan University. He started work Tuesday in Farmington as DPS director for an annual salary of \$13,500.
