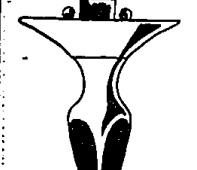

Polecat Hollow lives

Is there really a Polecat Hollow? Yes, indeed, says Debora Hartenberger, and it's not in a comic strip. She found it on a West Virginia map in the Southfield office where she works.

"I found a lot of surprising things — some rural street, stream and town names," said Hartenberger, a geographic assistant with the U.S. Census satellite office in Southfield.

A FORMER Chicagoan who now lives in Detroit, Hartenberger earned a degree in geography in 1986 at Northern Michigan University

in Marquette. This is the first full-time job where she has been able to put her skills to full use.

"This is the first time the census has ever used computer systems with census maps," she said.

Her work involves checking maps — starting with U.S. Geological Survey maps and correcting errors on street maps.

"We plat the census boundaries," she said. The maps that she and other staff members update are used by field workers, called enumerators, in counting the 20 dozen million Americans.

She is one of about 125 staff members who will do preparatory work for Michigan, Ohio and West Virginia

in the second floor offices at 27300 11 Mile.

At the peak, 125 workers will staff the regional center.

Officially, the U.S. Census will be taken April 1 of 1990.

IN MICHIGAN, governmental officials are particularly anxious for an accurate count because congressional representation depends on the census, according to spokeswoman Betty Hughes.

The expectation is that Michigan will lose two of its 18 U.S. representatives after the 1990 census. The state lost one after the 1980 census.

Federal aid and state legislative apportionment also depend on census numbers.

Dunn vs. Huber on trade bill

As a U.S. senator, Jim Dunn would have supported the protective trade bill passed by Congress and voted to override President Reagan's veto. Bob Huber would have voted against the bill.

The two rivals for the Aug. 2 Republican nomination against Democratic incumbent Don Riegle clashed sharply on the trade law Wednesday in a debate before the Oakland GOP 300 Club.

"I support the right of workers to have a 60-day notice of plant closings," said Dunn, 45-year-old East Lansing builder. "That's the least we can do for people who have given their lives for a company."

"Jim Barrett of the (Michigan State) Chamber of Commerce and John Thodis of the Michigan Manufacturers Association have both said the impending trade legislation would benefit Michigan."

IN A RARE — for Republicans — attack on the Reagan administration, Dunn said, "I don't believe this administration has been tough enough on its neighbors and competitors."

He said Reagan officials had given him "a bunch of double-talk on why it couldn't happen."

"Until we get to a level playing field, it is difficult for our businesses to compete," said Dunn, a one-term (1981-82) congressman from the 6th District.

"DISASTER," said Huber repeatedly in describing the trade law.

"As an industrialist (Michigan Chrome and Chemical Co. board chairman), I think it would be a disaster to tell people in your plant that in 60 to 90 days you're going to be closing the plant down."

"For those 60 or 90 days, I just can't imagine what would happen in a plant," said Huber, 65, former Troy mayor, state senator and also a one-term congressman.

Huber said other bad features of the bill that had been overlooked will:

- "Repeal the tax on windfall oil company profits. The oil producers want to keep those windfalls."

- "Give a \$1 billion increase in subsidies to exporters of agricultural products."

- "End U.S. criminal liability for paying bribes to overseas officials."

THE HOUSE voted 308-113 to override the president's veto. Among Michigan congressmen, all 11 Democrats and four Republicans voted to override. Three Republicans voted against.

The Senate's 61-37 vote was short of the two-thirds needed to override, but Senate Democratic leaders may force a second vote before the November elections. Michigan Democrats Riegle and Carl Levin voted to override.

Dunn and Huber renewed their dispute over Huber's proposal to use National Guard facilities to detain teenagers picked up in drug sweeps.

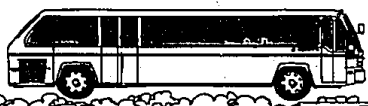
