This past week I heard Ron Holland, head football coach at North Farmington High, explain why the Raiders made it all the way this year to the Class A state championship.

Ron reports the 1970 Raiders are a remarkable team because they are smaller, physically, than most of their Class A opponents.

But this size "deficiency," Ron told Farmington Rotarians, was overcome by quickness on the field, aggressiveness, and acquisition of the fundamental skills of the game.

THE CHALLENGE of overcoming size with speed reminds this writer of a football field over 10 years ago in Frankennuth.

A player learns about speed when assigned to play offensive guard and defensive middle guard with a playing weight slightly under 130 pounds.

In those days, Frankennuth had a winning streak over a three-year period and was breaking Class C records. I spent two years on the junior varsity team which was allowed to lose either and we didn't during my two-years.

A SKINNY GUARD must overcome his opponent's size to remain among the starting 11.

My freshman year I stayed on the bench because I allowed myself to be swayed by someone 30-40 pounds heavier. The next year I started all season after learning how to overcome size.

Briefly, a skinny guard must learn to move quicker and hit harder, block at the stomach and tackle at the knees. On offense, throw shoulder pads into the opponent's stomach even when the play is on the other side of the line.

The first quarter is a psychological battle starting with the very first play. The skinny guard can be master for three quarters if he successfully psychs out his heavier foe during those first few minutes.

I cannot tell you, however, if a 130-pounder can be equally successful at the varsity level. I purposely decided not to continue my football career because of three events which occurred in the same game.

DURING THE LAST game of the season, with our team beating Cass City 12-6, the following occurred: I was knocked unconscious; I was scored on for the first time; and I lost my pants in the middle of the lighted field. It was this last event which confirmed my decision to retire.

The first event occurred on the third play of the game. Cass City had a 52, 160-pound fullback who was fast and hit hard. Hoss was clean

and fair, but nonetheless vicious.

On the first two plays, Hoss ripped off tackle for eight and 10 yard gains. I fully expected him to come up the center on the next play. On the third play, I was standing in the linebacker's crouch behind center, watched the snap and handoff to Hoss.

I can remember seeing the line open as my teammates were moved aside and can recall the sight of a helmet roaring straight at me about two feet off the ground.

The next thing I knew my feet left the ground and Hoss was my personal taxi for what seemed like 10 yards.

City Honors Ron Holland

FARMINGTON The City of Farmington has passed a resolution honoring Ronald G. Holland for his outstanding performance as head football coach of North Farmington High School.

Holland, a City of Farmington resident, has coached the NFHS Raider grid teams for more than 10 years and has compiled a 67-20-3 record.

This year, Holland was named "coach of the year" by Observer Newspapers, Inc., after leading his team to a 9-0 record and the Class A state championship.

The city's citation was given Holland during half-time ceremonies of Friday's basketball game.

The citation reads, in part, that Holland is one of the city's "outstanding citizens who has bestowed great honor on his community for his achievement in his chosen field as being named 1970 high school football coach of the year in the State of Michigan."

The resolution stated Holland has "established himself as one of the foremost football coaches in the annals of high school athletics" and "is dedicated to his profession as a teacher and coach" and had "not only developed winners as athletes but also as men."
