

Playoff game will decide South's fate

South Farmington let control of its own destiny slip from its grasp in the Little Caesar Control Man League hast week. Six players had multiple-hit games, led by Dave Mira-cle with three (including two doubles) and four RBI. Kevin Vanord also had three hits, driving in two runs, while Hardy had two hits (one a double), two RBI and three siolen bases. Miller had two hits and drove in two runs, too.

Chris Schmidt and Green added two hits apiece, with Schmidt knocking in a run and Green stealing two bases. Les Luark collected two RBI with a triple.

Hardy got through four innings (the game was stopped after five by the mercy rule), walking seven and giving up three hits and five runs, but fanning seven. Miller pitched the last inning.
