Job service system topic of TV show

Employers seeking professional, technical and managerial level employees now have quick access, at no fee, to a large pool of qualified applicants in six Midwestern states.

The Job Service Resume System, discussed on the cable TV program, "The Job Show," at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 18, is a joint venture of the state employment agencies in Michigan, Illinois, Ohio, Wisconsin, Indiana and Minnesota. The program is on MetroVision Channel 12.

An up-to-date file of 10,000 job seekers is maintained in the service's main computer. The Job Service Resume System accepts resumes from qualified job seekers and refers appropriate resumes to employers without charging a fee to either.

"It is a quick procedure," said Cheryl Walker, one of the program's coordinators at the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

After the employer's request for qualified applicants is received, the Job Service Resume System can usually find a good match in a 24-hour turnaround period, Walker said.

AMONG the occupations most frequently represented in the applicant pool are electrical engineers, electronics technicians and mechanical engineers. Other professionals in the file include accountants, systems analysts, programmers, chemical engineers and physicists.

On the other segment of this week's Job Show, Thomas Wilde, a Detroit area district manager for

HAR Block, will discuss his company's personal income tax preparation classes. These are designed to provide individuals with information about preparing their own tax forms, and for those who are interested in working as income tax form preparers.

CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order by Mayor Tupper at 8:00 p.m. on August 1, 1988, in Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan.

PRESENT: Campbell, Hartsock, Richardson, Tupper, Yoder.

OTHERS PRESENT: City Manager Deadman, Director Lauboff, Director Billing, Adm. Asst. Schultz, Acting City Clerk Murphy.

Minutes of the previous meeting of July 18, 1988, were approved as written. Minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

The following requests for sign variances were granted by Council:

To Peter Nielson's Sports Therapy Clinic, 23327 Orchard Lake Road, To In "N" Out Foods, 20710 Farmington Road.

To Mayan Tile, 30748 Grand River.

Council took no action on the request to transfer SDM and SDD utility licenses for Maple Village Pharmacy stores on Farmington Road (SDM) and Grand River (SDM & SDD).

Council tabled a decision on the Goodell-Grivas Engineers' traffic engineering analysis of Grand River Farmington Road and Grand River Shawwassee until the August 15th Council meeting.

Council agreed to support the State pit bull terror legislation and await legislative action before pursuing a local ordinance.

Council approved the second low proposal of \$20,830 from C.O. Cruesher (concrete for relocation of the water main at Farmington Road and Orchard Street).

Council approved final payment of \$163,242.96 to John Carlin, Inc. for the Chatham Hills Paving Rehabilitation Program.

Council set August 24, 1988, at 7:30 p.m. in the City of Novi Council Chambers for a special meeting of the Council of the six communities in the South Oakland Waste Consortium to review the study prepared by the consortium.

Public comment was heard.

Council named Mayor Tupper as Council's representative on the Public Safety Medical Safety Medical Insurance Trust Fund.

The Building Department Quarterly Report for April - June 1988, was reviewed and filed.

City Council adopted the following ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON BY ADDING NEW SUBSECTION TO CHAPTER 85, WHICH NEW SUBSECTION SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS SECTION 8-204 SUBSECTION (E), AND AMEND CHAPTER 88 SECTION 9-71 SUBSECTION (12).

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDINANCES

Chapter 85
Section 8-204, Side of Posts to Hang Fence
(Add New Subsection)

(e) The location of the fence posts may be placed on the opposite side of the fence as required by the provision of this section upon written waiver of the adjacent property owner nearest the fence affected by the location of the post. Such waiver shall be filed with the building inspector at such time a fence permit is requested.

Chapter 88, Nuisances
Section 9-71, Amend Subsection (12)

(12) The location of air conditioning units shall be to the rear and behind the structure and may not be located in the front or side yard open space. Use of the side yard open space may be permitted upon the approval of building inspector and upon the written waiver of the property owner adjacent to the open space on which the air conditioner is to be located. For hardship reasons the owner of the air conditioning unit to be installed may appeal the location requirement to the Board of Zoning Appeals.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on July 18, 1988, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting of the City Council on August 1, 1988, and will become effective ten (10) days after adoption.
