Trading cards for safety

Program promotes youth, police contact

Farmington Hills police have joined with the Detroit Lions and the Oscar Mayer Co. in a trading card program to help police help kids.

Twenty-three police departments throughout Michigan will participate in this 3-year-old program.

During the 14-week program, 3.5 million Lions trading cards will be distributed to provide positive encounters between youth and police, and to communicate crime prevention or safety tips.

The cards will be distributed exclusively by police to youngsters. The full-color cards include a Lions' action or feature picture on the front. On the back of the cards will be player information illustrated by cartoons, and a safety or crime prevention message.

A new card will be available from Farmington

Hills police each week beginning Aug. 22. The program will end the week of Thanksgiving.

"We're delighted to participate in the trading card program and believe it will bring our police officers and the young people of Farmington Hills together," said Farmington Hills police Chief William Dwyer.

POLICE WILL pass out the trading cards at schools, playgrounds and bus stops. Any youngster interested in obtaining these cards need only approach a Farmington Hills police officer and ask for one.

A poster featuring Lions' tackle Lomas Brown will help promote the program through its placement in schools, police stations and other locations. WJR-AM and WHYY-FM will serve as media co-sponsors.

3 new principals receive Walled Lake assignments

Three new principals — Alex Bender, Lois Ryan and Susan Winder — have received their assignments from Walled Lake Schools.

And Loon Lake Elementary principal Spencer Rush's request for transfer to Dublin Elementary has been granted.

Rush has served at Loon Lake for the past seven years. He replaces David Crawford, who retired in June.

Assignments for the three new principals are:

All appointments are effective Aug. 15.

BENDER WAS an elementary principal in Aigoune. He completed

his undergraduate work at the University of Michigan in 1977 and received a master's degree from Stanford University in 1982. He began his teaching career in the Troy Schools, where he taught fourth and fifth grades and served as head teacher.

Ryan, a member of the Walled Lake teaching staff, has for the past year been assigned as an elementary counselor at Walled Lake Elementary School. She has a bachelor's degree from the University of Michigan and a master's in reading from Oakland University. She began her career in Walled Lake in 1975.

Winder, an elementary school counselor in the Birmingham School District, has taught nearly every elementary grade during her career. She earned her bachelor's degree from the University of Maryland and completed a master's degree in guidance and counseling from Bowie State College, also in Maryland. She is pursuing a master's degree in educational administration from Michigan State University.

Hills council casts votes: no gambling

The Farmington Hills City Council followed the lead of Royal Oak officials by adopting a resolution in opposition to casino gambling in the state.

The unanimous passage declares the council's concern with how gambling will affect suburban communities.

"We are extremely concerned about the ramifications that will be felt not only by the city of Detroit, but by the suburbs and the state of Michigan," Royal Oak Mayor Robert Stocker said in a letter to Hills officials.

"We are in favor of a strong resolution in opposition," Hills councilwoman Jean Fox added.

Hills councilman Aldo Vagorzi said he is also concerned about alternative types of gambling, such as jai alai.

"They both attract the same criminal element," Vagorzi said. "The state has already legalized horse racing and the lottery."

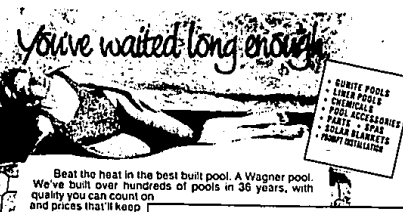
