Zoning battle may go to court

"This apartment plan sends out wrong message about the future

"This apartment plan sends out the wrong message about the future of Southfield," said Don Robb, vice president of the Cumberland Condominium Association. "Don't let this be a city of renters."

The Farmington Hills City Council has long opposed the proposed rezoning of property along the 11 Mille-Inkster area, which is residential.

"We felt the hard density was something that wasn't desirable," city manager William Costlek said. "We are concerned to see higher density extended along there. It density extended along there. It was the control of the council to the control of the council to the counc

dential development in Farmington Hills," according to the resolution. From 1-696 to Eight Mile in Farmington Hills, the Inkster corridor is residential, Costick said.

The Southfield school board stands to get 42.5 million from Occidental Development for the 50-acre tract on the east side of Inkster Road south of 11 Mile if it's rezoned for a two-story, 557-unit apartment complex.

THE SCHOOL board earlier in the controversy pledged \$50,000 toward attorney fees if the rezoning was dended. The planning commission had twice rejected plans for the project. Robert Wright, school board president, said Tuesday the Issue will probably proceed through legal channels. But it's up to the board to decide, he added.

Stephen Bromberg, an attorney representing Occidental and the school board, made no public men-

tion of a lawsuit. But he called the single-family zoning on the property "unconstitutional and confiscatory." Homeowners gave several reasons for their opposition.

Two-lane Inkster Road is inade-counter to handle traffit from a \$52.

Two-lane Inister Road is inade-quate to handle traffic from a \$57-unit spartment project in the bur-geoning northwest section of the city, homeowners said.

An apartment complex on the last remaining undeveloped stronghold in the area would overburden the ex-isting sewer system on 11 Mile, ac-cording to residents. That system wasn't designed for an apartment on the site, according to city engineers.

BUT BROMBERG maintains the BUT BROMBERG maintains the site is economically unfeasible for single-family residential develop-ment. City officials, however, say homes can be marketed and are a viable use for the property. Apart-ments would be out of character with the neighborhood, officials said.

The future land use plan pegs the land for schools and parks.

Wright, who voted for the school's contribution for legal fees, said, "The city and schools shouldn't disagree over property. I'm not mad at the city council. They do what they have to do, and we do what they have to do, and we do what we have to do. But we shouldn't point the finger at each other. There should be no sour grapes."

School district attorney Bert Shifman said the schools are obligated to dispose of the surplus property for the benefit of city taxpayers.

"This isn't a question of choice, but of necessity," he said. "Without good schools, Southfield can't attract young families. Hiring professionals to staff the schools requires increasing revenues. The need for money doesn't decrease with a declining enrollment."




