Reynolds and city manager William Costick recommended Dornan for the job, which pays \$46,000 annually, a salary increase of \$14,000 a year for Dornan.

However, "My hourly rate has gone down," she said, laughing, referring to the long hours she is putting in. "I got a new job and lost a lunch hour somehow. But that will change. It's all new now."

Dornan has made only minor administrative changes in the office since assuming duties because "JoAn ran a pretty good, tight office," she said, and she has been busy attending to August primary elections. She is now preparing for general elections in November.

DURING A typical day, Dornan

arrives for work between 7:30 and 8 a.m., sorts the mail, attends to correspondence and deals with public requests and complaints.

After a brief lunch, she proofreads minutes from a myriad of weekly meetings, attends a meeting or two and then prepares for upcoming elections. She leaves the office between 6 and 6:30 p.m., catches a bite to eat and often attends an evening meeting.

The meetings are essential, "to keep in touch and know what's going on, to stay involved in the functioning of the city," she said.

This public contact is Dornan's favorite part of the job.

DORNAN'S MARRIAGE last year culminated a six-year courtship with Michael. The couple met on the job in Walled Lake, he as city manager

and she as deputy clerk.

"We decided it was time to put the family together," she said of the marriage.

Dornan has two children from a previous marriage, Danielle, 15, and Christopher, 13.

Raised in Walled Lake, she graduated from Walled Lake schools in 1970. After working four years for Channel 50, a Detroit television station, she took a job in the Walled Lake clerk's office.

DURING 10 years in that job, Dornan earned state certification as a municipal clerk from Michigan State University in Lansing. Earlier this year, she received municipal clerk certification from the International Institute of Municipal Clerks.

"When I first started, most city clerks in the state were old men,"

she said.

Over the years, that has changed. Today, many clerks are female and many, like Dornan, are young, she said.

She calls Farmington Hills a progressive city, citing home occupation and home party ordinances as examples.

"We were one of the first to have the home party ordinance on the books, holding parents responsible for youths who drink."

Dornan is now seeking a deputy clerk, the position she once held. She has been speaking with a half dozen applicants from a field of 45 who applied.

On this day, she readies for an evening meeting, one on solid waste in the city of Novi. Husband Michael will be at the meeting, representing Walled Lake.

Japanese youths visit county 4-H families
