Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week:

● DRUG CHARGES
Two Detroit men in their 20s face felony charges in connection with the discovery of a rock of crack cocaine in their car Tuesday in Farmington Hills.
Arraigned Wednesday before District Judge Margaret Schaeffer of Farmington, the two stood mute to possessing a controlled substance less than 25 grams. One of the men also was charged with receiving and concealing stolen property over \$100.
Innocent pleas were entered in their behalf. Bond was set at \$25,000 pending a preliminary exam in 47th District Court.
The men face up to four years in prison if convicted of the drug charges. Conviction of the other charge brings a penalty of up to five years in prison.
The men were arrested at 11 p.m. Tuesday near Grand River and Eight Mile. Their car was seen without

headlights, and it was discovered to be stolen from Detroit Aug. 21, according to Farmington Hills police.
● BREAK-IN ARRESTS
An 18-year-old Farmington Hills man is charged with burglarizing a house on Tuck, near Fink, Wednesday.
Arraigned Thursday before District Judge Michael Hand of Farmington, the man pleaded not guilty to one count of breaking and entering of an occupied dwelling with intent to commit larceny. An innocent plea was entered in his behalf. Bond was set at \$5,000 pending a preliminary exam in 47th District Court. The defendant faces up to 15 years in prison if convicted.
A color TV, a VCR, an answering machine, a telephone, three leather jackets, cash and a cassette player valued at \$2,200 were reported stolen in the late morning break-in. Some of the property was recovered, according to Farmington Hills police.
Three Detroit men in their early 20s are charged with breaking into a

unit on Gateway Drive at Gateway Apartments Wednesday before District Judge Margaret Schaeffer of Farmington, the men pleaded not guilty to one count of breaking and entering of an occupied dwelling with intent to commit larceny. Bond was set at \$5,000 pending a preliminary exam in 47th District Court. The men face up to 15 years in prison if convicted.
Southfield police arrested the suspects after witnesses provided a description of the burglars and their getaway car. Taken in the 12:30 p.m. break-in were a color TV, a VCR, a telephone and other items valued at \$1,500. All of the property was recovered, according to Farmington Hills police.
