

Glenn passes North in Lakes grid finale

If there was any doubt about Westland John Glenn's ability to throw the football, quarterback Eric Stover laid that to rest Friday.

The junior signal caller connected nine of 14 passes for 118 yards, including three touchdown tosses, leading the bost Rockets to a 20-6 victory over previously unbeaten North Farmington.

By winning the Lakes Division tile again, Glenn's victory sets up another classic confrontation Saturday with another unbeaten team, Farmington Harrison. Glenn has beaten the Hawks in two previous Western Lakes Activities Association championship games, including a 14-6 victory last season, (Harrison will host Saturday's WLAA final at 1 pm.)
