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Music and film shorts lead to feature movie

TRAINING AND SCHOOLING are important, said Los Angeles-based film director Jimmy Lifton, but hands-on experience is the best way to learn.

"Real knowledge comes from getting your hands-on experience and doing the work," Lifton said, from the Mt. Clemens offices of Orphan Inc., a record and film production company.

Lifton's schooling trail led him from Southfield High School to the Berklee College of Music in Boston, to the Toronto Conservatory of Music and then to the UCLA Film School. Lifton began his career with music video and short films.

"We started with low-budget music videos," he said. "No one made any money, but we actually did things."

First of these projects for Lifton was a music video on which he was producer, director and star. Although it was a low-budget project, it was nominated for Best Independent Production by Broadcast Magazine.

"I graduated out of music video," said Lifton of his jump into film. "I

started directing. Then into commercials and then into film shorts. It was a natural growth into movies."

LIFTON'S LATEST project is a teen thriller called "Innocent Blood," to be filmed in Hollywood.

"The movie centers on three teenage girls and an antique mirror given to one of the girls by her parents," he said. "Unbeknownst to the girls, the mirror holds captive a spirit who grants the girls' wishes."

The film is based on an old story called "The Monkey's Paw." It is in the horror genre, more like "Carrie" or "Rosemary's Baby." It's not a suspense thriller."

The script was custom adapted for Orphan Eyes, the movie division of Orphan Inc., by sisters Annette and Gina Cascone of New York. Orphan Records will release a soundtrack concurrently with the release of the film.

Lifton said the storyline is good, and they already have had a book offer for it. Distribution offers also are coming in for the film.

He has several sponsors for the film. These include Pepsi Cola, Caty, Honda, Toshiba, Levi Strauss, Evian Water, Ray Ban Sunglasses and Shasta Pop.

Actors in the production include a

wide variety of experienced and inexperienced talent. Among local performers appearing in small roles in the film are James Earl Baker of Detroit and Scott Campbell of Upper Woodstock.

Lifton is pleased with the cast.

"Zelda Rubinstein, the psychic from the 'Poltergeist' movie, is in 'Innocent Blood,'" he said. "Alice Carter who was in 'Young Guns' and Alexis Arquette (brother of actress Rosan-

na Arquette) will star.

"WE WILL START" shooting at the beginning of January for 23 days. It will be completed by spring."

Lifton divides his time 70/30 between Los Angeles and Mt. Clemens, working on projects for Orphan.

Next step for Orphan Eyes is a five-movie package that is in the works now. Lifton said two of the five films will be shot in Detroit, the first one beginning this spring.
