'Love' Growing In Farmington

FARMINGTON A group of Farmington women is proving that love, given a start, will do a lot of growing on its own.

A Christmas project started by the women of Hunter's Ridge Apartments, on 14 Mile Rd. west of Orchard Lake in Farmington Township, has caught the community interest and shows signs of becoming a year-round outlet for the energies of volunteers.

THE PROJECT, called "From Hunter's Ridge with Love", put the finishing touches last week on a Christmas gift-giving spree which project chairman Rose Greenbert said has "mushroomed" way beyond my expectations.

Last week the group distributed some 74 hand-made Christmas stockings, filled to the brim with love and candy, to kids at the Lutheran Evangelical Center and Children's Hospital, as well as nearly 200 gift packages to the residents of the Lutheran Evangelical Home on Outer Drive.

Mrs. Greenbert said the idea began when the Norwood Country Club in Hunter's Ridge discussed plans for making and distributing layettes for Children's Hospital this Christmas.

The idea caught on and soon blossomed from "Norwood with Love" into "Hunter's Ridge with Love" as other women in the apartment complex took an interest.

A NEWS story about the project spread the word and "Love" started to grow. Several local merchants, large and small, donated gifts, candy, and transportation to the Hunter's Ridge women, including a nearby interior decorator who spotted their stalled truck last week and made the deliveries in time for Christmas.

The response from individuals was just as overwhelming, according to Mrs. Greenbert, and both gifts and money flowed into the group from several sources. One donor sent a box of coloring books for the Christmas

stockings, signed only "Mrs. X."

The Hunter's Ridge group met once a week making and filling the Christmas packages and Mrs. Greenbert said she expects the women will continue to meet during the coming year to work on a number of projects.

"WHATEVER we give, we

give with love," said Mrs. Greenbert, "and we hope the idea will permeate—will spread to other people."

Indications are that the spreading has already begun. Three women's groups from other apartment complexes have called Mrs. Greenbert to ask for help in starting their own "love projects."
