Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week:

● DRUG PARAPHERNALIA

Five people, ages 20-30, were ticketed for possessing drug paraphernalia during a traffic stop on Grand River and M-102 Tuesday. One suspect is from Farmington Hills, one is from Greenwood, Mich., and three are from Detroit.

Innocent pleas were entered at their arraignment Wednesday before District Judge Margaret Schaeffer of Farmington. Cash/surety bond was set at \$500 pending disposition of the criminal ordinance tickets. Conviction could bring a penalty of up to 90 days in jail and a \$500 fine.

The car was stopped as it left the Rainbow Park Motel, 30991 Grand

River, at 11:30 p.m. That was just before officers executed a warrant, signed by Schaeffer, to search the room the suspects had been in, said Sgt. Charles Nebus, Farmington Hills Police Department Detective Section supervisor.

In addition to finding drug paraphernalia in the suspect's car, officers found some in the motel room. "There was evidence of drug trafficking but no major seizures," Nebus said.

The search warrant affidavit was based on information indicating crack cocaine could be found in the room. "We found evidence of it — residues," Nebus said.

● STRONG-ARM ROBBERY

A woman was knocked into the bushes Dec. 16, as she resisted a man

who snatched her purse outside Kensington Manor Apartments.

According to a Farmington Department of Public Safety report, the 66-year-old victim, a Farmington resident, was outside the complex when the young man approached her and grabbed the purse after pushing her down. He left in a small, dark vehicle toward Farmington Road.

The purse was later recovered in the parking lot at Village Oaks Apartments, near Orchard Lake Road and Eight Mile in Farmington Hills. Cash from the purse was missing. The victim was not badly hurt.

● FELONIOUS ASSAULT

A 27-year-old Farmington Hills man reported that he was assaulted by a man with a gun outside his house on Jefferson Wednesday night.

According to a Farmington Hills police report:

The man arrived home about 9 p.m. then went back to his car parked in the driveway. That's when he was approached by a gunman who ordered him to "freeze" and put his hands on the car.

As the man took a few steps, he heard a noise behind him and saw another man run toward Jefferson. The gunman then ran toward Jefferson.

The victim chased the other two men south on Jefferson. He lost one of them near a house on Independence. The other man ran back toward the victim's house and got into a car parked near Liberty.

● WINDOW SHATTERED

The window of a moving car was shattered shortly before 5 p.m. as it

traveled south on Orchard Lake Road near Shiloh Tuesday.

According to a Farmington Department of Public Safety report, no one was hurt in the incident, which caused an estimated \$125 in damage. As the driver drove just south of Shiloh, he heard a loud pop, then noticed the shattered left passenger's window.
