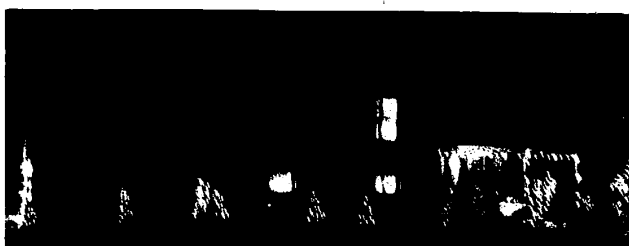

Hospital Supported By City

FARMINGTON The Farmington City Council has adopted a resolution urging location of a general hospital in the Farmington area.

The council approved the resolution 5-0 and mailed it to the Greater Detroit Hospital Council (GDHC).

Farmington Township for a number of months has been attempting to get approval from the GDHC for location of a general medical hospital on a 20-acre site near 13 Mile and Haggerty Rds.

A township trustee has been serving as liaison between a group of doctors seeking approval for the hospital in Farmington Township and the GDHC, the agency which must grant approval.

The city's resolution, approved Dec. 21, states that in the Farmington area.

there is a definite need for hospital beds for patients and potential patients for use of general hospital services.

The resolution notes the city and township populations have doubled during the past 10 years and should reach 120,000 persons by 1980.
