Workers, jobs matched

The Job Service Resume System matches professional, managerial and technical-level job seekers with companies looking for applicants in those fields.

The two-year-old computerized system matches employers and job hunters in six midwestern states, including Michigan, Minnesota, Illinois, Wisconsin, Ohio and Indiana. It is administered by the state Job Service agencies in those states.

"It's free and it's fast," said Cheryl Walker of the Michigan Employment Security Commission. "We can usually pull down a resume within 24 hours. And most of the applicants have experience."

"We have an applicant pool that a small- to medium-size employer would otherwise not have access to," said Walker, a guest on the cable television program, "The Job Show," airing at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 26, on Metrovision Channel 12.

She said job seekers provide resume information, which includes educational background, job experience and the types of industries in which the applicant would be interested in working.

Employers provide a similarly detailed description of the position they want to fill. The system's mainframe computer in Wisconsin scans the information about various applicants and produces resumes of workers who are qualified for those jobs.

Employers are under no obligation to hire, or even interview, any of the applicants suggested by the Job Service Resume System, says Walker.

According to Walker, there are 10,000 up-to-date applications in the file at any one time, including electrical, chemical and mechanical engineers, systems analysts, programmers, accountants and physicalists.

Other segments of this edition of "The Job Show" will feature information on how to prepare a good resume and cover letter, and advice to young people on career planning.
