



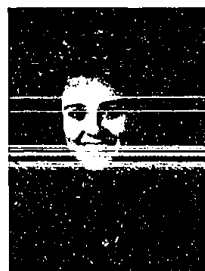

Good citizens named

Quakertown Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution will honor 10 good citizens and their parents at an 11 a.m. brunch Saturday, Feb. 18, in Farmington Hills Branch Library.

Jackie Lee, Quakertown regent, will preside at the meeting immediately after brunch. Lucile Fairchild, chapter Good Citizens chair, will present each student with a Good Citizen pin, a certificate, and a U.S. Constitution poster.

The Good Citizens are high school seniors who have been judged to have qualities of leadership, dependability, service and patriotism. All are automatic contenders for the state competition and the finalists will be guests of the Michigan State Society DAR at their Awards Day in East Lansing April 4-5. Fifty-eight chapters in the state sponsor the Good Citizens contest.

The program for the day will be presented by the Lexington Farm Chapter of Children of the American Revolution. Members will present the play "Martha Washington's Dream," which was written by a DAR member. The children will also participate in a flag ceremony.

At Awards Day, the Michigan State Society of DAR will present eight runners-up with \$35 checks, the second-place winner with a \$75 check and the state winner with a state winner's pin, \$100 from a National Society DAR and \$50 from the Michigan State Society. Michigan's Good Citizen will compete with winners from other states for seven division awards of \$250 each.

Then three National Good Citizens are chosen. Second- and third-place winners will receive \$750 and \$500 scholarships, respectively. The National Good Citizen will be presented in April at the DAR Continental Congress, in Washington, D.C. The winner will receive a sterling silver Reverse bowl and a \$1,000 scholarship.

Mersey High School, daughter of Frank and Susan Kulha of Northville; Jennifer Makuch from Our Lady of Mount Carmel High School, daughter of Gerald and Bernadette Makuch of Wyandotte; Benjamin Odum from Plymouth Christian Academy, son of Howard and Nancy Odum of Canton; Pamela King from Romulus Senior High School, daughter of James and Vickie King of Romulus; Rachel Abramson from Southgate Thomas J. Anderson High School, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence DeLozier; Sheila Manis from Truman High School, daughter of Barraskia and Shirley Manis of Taylor; and Robin Branch from Temple Christian School. She has had 10 years of Chinese language study, drama and dancing. She is currently Miss Teen of Detroit.

SEABOLT is a member of the varsity baseball team and is captain of the soccer team. He is president of both the National Honor Society and the Student Council and is a member of the French Club and Math Club. He has part-time jobs at both the Farmington YMCA and at Farmington Hills Parks and Recreation.

None of the goodies left to get stolen

When a Baker's Loaf customer told the staff how sorry she was about the downtown Farmington shop being burglarized a couple of weeks ago, she jokingly asked how many goodies the thief had been able to carry away.

"He didn't get any," said June Quigley, a West Bloomfield resident who is a regular shopper in Village Commons. "None of those marvelous tarts or eclairs are kept from one day to the next. Every night they are packed up and shipped to a nursing home. What a marvelous thing for the residents, and what a marvelous thing for a customer who doesn't have to search the bottom of a box looking for an expiration date."

Residents in Detroit's Kundig Center are the recipients of the goodies stemming from the time

the grandfather of Baker's Loaf owner Duane Christ was living there.

"That started about 11 years ago when he would visit our shop on Northwestern," said Paula Christ. "We'd send grandfather home with anything broken or left over and he became a pretty popular fellow out there. Then he would bring his friends with him to watch what was going on in our kitchen. Then we started bringing the sheet cakes for birthday parties or ice cream socials."

Grandfather has since died, but the Christ retain their affiliation with the residents in Kundig Center.

"The nun who works in the kitchen is very creative in using broken bread, or whatever we send," Paula Christ said.

Music appreciation series is offered

Concert pianist David Syme is presenting a series of music appreciation classes designed for both the new and sophisticated listener.

"The Joy of Music" is offered each Wednesday 10-11:45 a.m. at Temple Israel, 5725 Walnut Lake Road, West Bloomfield.

"Each lecture is separate and self-contained, so a person doesn't have to attend them all in order to understand what's going on," said Syme. "I've done a lot of concerts in North America and Europe, but I can only play in Detroit once or twice per year. I just moved back to this area after 15 years away, and I wanted a way to share what I do with others on an ongoing basis."

Syme is the son of local Rabbi M. Robert Syme.

The courses, which run through April 12, include insights into the background of famous classical composers, such as as Chopin, Liszt, Mozart, Beethoven and many more.

Other classes will help participants learn the difference between baroque, classical, romantic and modern music, or help them go to an opera with confidence.

"A lot of people are mystified by classical music and I want to demystify it for them," Syme said. "These classes are for people who know everything about classical music and for people who think they know nothing."

Syme does up to one-half hour of performing during each session in order to illustrate the points he's trying to make. He has performed with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and in concert halls the world over, including London, Scotland, Mexico, Germany and the Netherlands.

Classes are \$10 each. Payment may be made in advance through the Temple or walk-ins are welcome. Call 661-5700 for more information.

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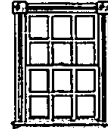
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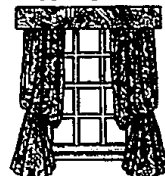
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
