I just moved back to this area after 15 years away, and I wanted a way to share what I do with others on an ongoing basis."

Syme is the son of local Rabbi M. Robert Syme.

The courses, which run through April 12, include insights into the background of famous classical composers, such as as Chopin, Liszt, Mozart, Beethoven and many more.

Other classes will help participants learn the difference between ba-roque, classical, romantic and mod-ern music, or help them go to an op-era with confidence.

"A lot of people are mystified by classical music and I want to demys-tify it for them," Syme sald. "These classes are for people who know ev-erything about classical music and for people who think they know noth-ing."


