

Most Students Return To Eagle Elementary

Most of the students of Eagle Elementary School at 29410 W. 14 Mile Rd. were back in their school Monday, a week after a fire destroyed the kindergarten area of the school.

Supt. Roderick Smith said first through sixth grade students attended part-time Monday and were scheduled for a full day of classes on Tuesday.

THE FIRE, which occurred early May 25, apparently was started by vandals.

A bottled gas torch was found in the kindergarten area of the school where the fire started. Damage to the building was estimated at \$500,000.

"We're amazed we were able to recoup as fast as we did," the superintendent commented.

He credited the contractor on the refurbishing job, Burton Brothers and the school's staff for the preparations. Smith said the contractor is a specialist in fire reclamation work.

Smith estimated about 90 kindergartners and special education students of the school were dismissed. About 400 students will finish the school year.

THE FIRST through sixth grade classes, which originally numbered 15, were condensed into 15 for the remainder of the year, Dr. Smith said.

He added one teacher had

opened to be on sick leave and was not replaced, so no teachers were reassigned.

The kindergarten teacher, he noted, is working on school records and special education

teachers are preparing for the summer session.

Smith said some student materials were damaged, mostly by smoke. A major portion of Monday was spent repairing books and other materials.

FARMINGTON Gary Dix of Farmington is one of Western Michigan University men who have been initiated into Phi Eta Sigma.

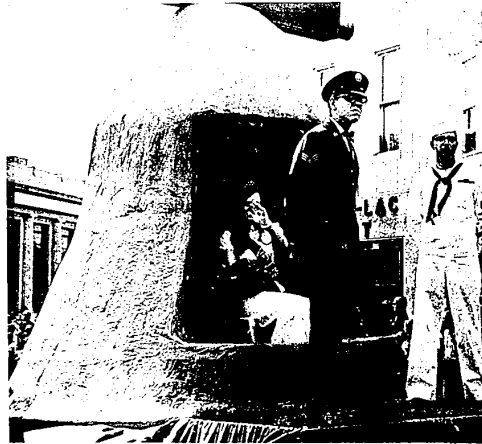
