

# Oakland College Board Seats Are Goal Of 7

Registered Oakland County voters are eligible to cast their ballots in area public schools and in the board room of the George A. Bee Administration Center, 2480 Opdyke Road, Bloomfield Hills.

Seven candidates will vie for two openings on the Oakland Community College Board when voters go to the polls June 8.

**EARL M. ANDERSON**, a six-year veteran of the board, is a high school graduate with two years of college. He was elected to the Madison Heights Charter Commission in 1965.

"I have been a charter member of the OCC board since the beginning of the school. As one who has served in the labor movement for over 30 years, I have first-hand experience in seeing the great need for more opportunities for the various trades.

"I was a strong supporter of the college's vocational and technical programs and the \$3 million technical building scheduled for completion at the Auburn Hills campus."

Anderson is also married and the father of two children.

**HAVING SPENT** over 40 years in school work as teach-

er, principal and superintendent, Eugene L. Johnson said he feels he can be "helpful in the development and improvement of Oakland Community College."

He pledged to work on "internal planning" at the college to "bring about North Central accreditation along with additional programs for students wishing to go beyond the two years of community college work. A strengthening of board policy will give the administration the staff an opportunity to develop guidelines for strong college organization."

**ONE OF THE** youngest candidates is Raymond M. Genick, 34, who is presently associate director of credit programs for the division of urban extension, Wayne State University.

Genick is the father of three children and vice president of Burton Elementary School PTA, Berkley. He earned his BS, MEd and EdS degrees in educational administration and is working toward a PhD in education curriculum development.

He feels his youth will "help overcome the frustrating lack of communication between students, administrators and the community."

**ALEXANDER J. KLOSTER**, present superintendent of Hamtramck Public Schools, has been involved in education since 1955. He earned his BA and MA from Michigan State University and holds a permanent secondary teaching certificate from the state of Michigan.

Married and the father of two children, he was finance consultant for the Department of Public Instruction for the state of Michigan from July, 1960-October, 1969 and directed the budget for Detroit public schools in 1962-63.

He served as chairman of the State Board of Education and chief executive officer for the state education agency and was responsible for reorganizing the state education agency as required by the state constitution.

Besides working as superintendent of Hamtramck public schools, he also owns and directs the Midwest Institute of Management.

**CHARLES HOLMES**, a four-year resident of Bloomfield Hills, is presently deputy director of the Office of Economic Opportunity for Oakland County.

One of the original planners of that office, he received his BA degree from the University of Michigan in 1950 and a BS in group work from George Williams University in Chicago. In 1952 he earned an MS degree in human development from the University of Chicago.

Holmes has 11 years administrative and executive experience in the YMCA in New York, Ohio and Michigan. He is active in the Birmingham Methodist Church.

"There is a definite need for more vocational training programs and better communication between the school and the community," he says.

**DAVID M. PRESTON**, a University of Michigan law graduate and a practicing Birmingham lawyer, has spent the last 16 months on the board gaining "invaluable background and experience in complex affairs of the college."

"Working in the law field, I can bring a broad background in problem solving and long range planning, which constitute the primary work of the board," he said. "It will be a pleasure to work for economy and a balanced budget."

He is married and the father of two children.

**DONALD F. LOPER**, candidate from Pontiac, manages the Queen's Way of Fashion line. He attended Los Angeles Business School and studied data processing at Oakland Community College for two years.

"After attending many board meetings, I feel I have an insight into the problems at the school, including official accreditation. Taxpayers should be kept more informed about the campus."

He pledged to seek more cooperation between the board, administrators and students.

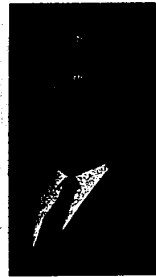
