# Stirling Boosts Curriculum Change

 Seeking to provide the soundest educational program possible with limited school funds available, Mrs. Kathryn (Kay) Stirling has announced her candidacy in the June 8 election for a four-year term on the Farmington School Board.  
 No stranger to service in the Ohio community in which she and her family formerly resided, Mrs. Stirling was winner of a community service award in her former home town of Lima.

"As a member of the Lima School's Citizens Advisory Board and as its curriculum chairman, we were faced with problems similar to those facing Farmington schools — to offer sound education within the framework of our limited funds," she emphasized.  
 "Living in a constantly changing environment, such as ours, is challenging and should be stimulating and rewarding experience, if one is prepared. Our curriculum must be directed toward this preparation."  
 "We must utilize new teaching techniques that stress analytical, critical thinking which, in turn, will help students to make sound value judgments based upon sound research."  
 "We should take full advantage of new programs proven in other schools, of educators

use of such facilities should be carefully studied, and soon.  
 "We could take advantage of studies made by other systems which used federal grants. If applicable, we should weigh this approach in the balance with expansion costs."  
 "In short," Mrs. Stirling said, "I would like to insure that the Farmington School District graduates responsible, informed and thinking students who will be prepared to make a contribution in their strongly competitive, constantly changing environment."

A TWO-YEAR RESIDENT of the Farmington area living at 38014 Southfarm Lane in Meadowbrook Hills, Mrs. Stirling says she has attended

almost every meeting of the Farmington board for the past year.  
 Her husband, John Stirling, is industrial relations manager of the Ypsilanti plant of the Ford Motor Co.  
 Mr. and Mrs. Stirling have two sons, one attending Farmington Senior High and the other attending the University of Michigan.

WHILE RESIDING IN Lima, Mrs. Stirling was a lead Scout volunteer, Girl Scout troop leader, and a member of the Girl Scout board - Appleside Ridge Council, and a Cub Scout den mother.

She held several offices in the PTA and was president of the Mother Study Club. A 10-

year member of the Junior League, Mrs. Stirling was also active in community service work with the Red Cross Blood

Bank, United Fund, Salvation Army, Hospital Auxiliary and the YWCA.
