WL won't use seat belts on grade school buses

There'll be no seatbelts for elementary students in Walled Lake Consolidated Schools.

The district includes part of northwest Farmington Hills.
According to the National Highway Traffle Safety Association, elementary-age youngsters are better off riding in buses that have been compartmentalized, meaning they are seated close together between seats that are padded back and front.

"This system protects them more than seat belts that have been shown to cause more damage," said Charles Kissaw, operations director. The National Traffic Safety Board


